Uranium Producers Told May Sell Product Abroad

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian uranium producers Wednesday received government authority for the first time to sell small quantities of surplus uranium to foreign countries for testing and research purposes.

Trade Minister Gordon Churchill announced that such sales will be subject "to the condition that export permits be obtained from the atomic energy control board and the department of trade and commerce."

Under the arrangement permits will restrict individual sales to 250 pounds, with the uranium being used only for testing and research. The total of such sales to any one country must not exceed 2,500 pounds, unless the government of the recipient country has entered into an agreement with the Canadian government

Eniwetok is about 3,000 miles from the base at Christmas Island, headquarters for Britain's testing operations.

Boston Reports Record Rainfall

BOSTON (AP) — The weather bureau said Wednesday more rain has fallen in the Greater Boston area in the last six months than during any similar period since it started keeping records in 1872. The bureau said the six-month total was 41.82 inches. The normal fall for the entire year is 38.76 inches. Since the beginning of this year, the bureau said, rain has totalled 27.71 inches, compared to a normal 13.92. This year's total is the second highest four-month total on record. The record was set during August-November, 1955, when 32.11 inches fell.
