"I cannot forget how the boys from different countries get along so well as Scouts when the daily papers are full of the differences which keep Nations apart," Roger Craig, Queen Scout and member of the Island contingent to the 9th World Jamboree held last month at Coldfield, England, told Rotarians at their weekly luncheon meeting yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Lloyd Maheew of O'Leary, Scout Leader of the contingent, shared speaking-time with Patrol Leader Roger Craig of Charlottetown in taking the Rotarians over the territory covered by Scouts in their overseas jaunt in a manner which made every experience very vivid and entertaining.

Mr. Matthews described the flight over, terminating with their billeting in Surrey, followed by a conducted tour of ten days duration which took the scouts all over England.

Up to as many as ten thousand visitors were at camp nearly every day and Mr. Matthews was amazed to meet so many English people who had read "Ann of Green Gables" and anxious to talk about the Island as visualized from their reading.

Mr. Matthews said, "I never saw better scouts than our contingent and believe me they made a hit with the other boys when they overcame the shortcomings of cooking arrangements in the prevailing rain, by erecting their own cooking facilities of brick, don't ask me where they got the material," Mr. Matthews said.

Patrol Leader Craig stressed the thrilling experience of the camp opening by Queen Elizabeth II the aerial displays glider exhibits by the English scouts who specialized in air work, sea scouts, etc. A typical day in camp made ample provision for visiting and exchanging souvenirs with other scout units. Reference was also made to a trip to Paris by some of the Island boys where arrangements had been made by Mr. Ben Rogers, Manager of the Bank of Montreal in Charlottetown with their representative there to see that the boys had a good time. "We sure did," Patrol Leader Craig said.

### Ships Collide In Dense Fog

QUEBEC (CP)—A British coal-carrier and a German freighter collided in dense fog near the north shore St. Lawrence River: town of St. Siméon, Que., early Sunday, both suffering damaged bows above the waterline. No one was injured.

The mishap occurred about 4 a.m. off Cape Salmon, 82 miles northeast of Quebec City. Both ships—the 4,564-ton British vessel Mapledore and the 1,500-ton German ship Ciandra—were able to steam to Quebec City under their own power.

Damage estimates were not immediately available. The Mapledore, with a three-to-four-foot hole on the port side near the bow, appeared to have got the worst of the crash.

The Mapledore was Quebec City-bound from Sydney, N.S. with coal for the Canadian Import Company. The Ciandra was outbound from Montreal.

### Claims Textiles Not Protected

MARYSVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Protection provided the Canadian textile industry under present tariff agreements is "protection in name only," an official said here Saturday.

A. V. Young of Hamilton, Ont., president of Marysville Mills and the parent company, Hamilton Cotton Company, Limited, spoke at the formal re-opening of Marysville Mills. A similar New Brunswick industry, Textile Sales Limited, is being forced to close at Milltown.

"The textile industry is not a business which enjoys a sheltered existence and built-in prosperity behind a high tariff wall," Mr. Young said. "The protection this industry enjoys is protection in name only—one which is now both out-dated and unrealistic in the face of present-day foreign competition."

"As long as... the loop-holes exist in our tariff on cottons, there will be difficulties to surmount, and the expansion of this mill will be more than a \$64,000 question. It will be a multi-million-dollar question."

Mr. L.C. Callbeck, Associate Plant Pathologist, Science Service Laboratory, leaves this morning by plane for Guelph, Ontario, where he will address the Canadian Potato Industry on "Top Killers are Modern Aids in Maturity."

The conference at which Mr. Callbeck has been invited to speak will take place at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph Ontario August 28-31.

Its chief object is to bring together representatives of all groups directly concerned with the welfare of the potato industry—growers, shippers, wholesalers, consumers, and officials of government and research agencies—in order to review and analyze present trends in the production and marketing of this important food item.
