Dear Mary Haworth: I have read your problems for some time and you can help me with this situation. Babe, 14, is a girl who came to stay with us eight months ago. She is very boy crazy. At first it was married men.

ENJOYS FOSTER FAMILY Babe says she loves it here in our home. She has changed over to our way of thinking, considering the short time she's been with us. We have shown great love for her. She has even asked if she may be one of us, and wants us to adopt her.

I have talked to her about the boys, telling her that they may hurt her, but it does no good. The case worker tells me not to worry about the younger boys, just boys her age. I've asked my sons to push her away, but that won't work. We feel the boys are too young for much explanation; and yet this may be unfair to them. Please help us. A.P.

CONCERN IS WARRANTED

Dear A.P.: In my opinion, your mother instinct is sound, and the case worker is wrong in appraising the potentials of Babe's excessive love play with your small son.

The case worker's soothing indication that Babe's behavior on this score isn't a matter for concern, suggests that she is more of a theorist than a woman of experience, in the field of child rearing. Also it suggests that she has a one-track mind, and that her mind is so fixed upon Babe's requirements of help, in your situation, that she overlooks safeguarding your son's welfare, in association with Babe.

While fully sympathetic to Babe's difficulties, we nevertheless must recognize that she is an emotionally maladjusted youngster, who has been twisted by family devotion. Her own craziness and bids for favor with married men (have been) symptoms of desperate need to love and be loved. Under your sympathetic wing, this misdirected drive has been abated somewhat, due to your counsel and the health of your personality, p. 8, p. 5. But Babe's underlying hunger for physical identification with loving and beloved persons is still there; and at present she is trying blindly to assuage it via aggressive erotic kissing-and-tickling of your sons.

ASSERT YOURSELF

I happen to think that persons who tickle children are sadists of sorts, maybe witlessly. Also, I feel that children should be defended from self-indulgent kissers, who (in kissing) show lack of respect for a child's inherent dignity. In short, I feel just about as you do. Thus my advice is to assert yourself as mother in charge of the children's interchange, and call a halt on Babe's roughhouse, period. You don't have to explain to either side, other than to say it's not the way for her to behave, and if you want no more of it, M.H. 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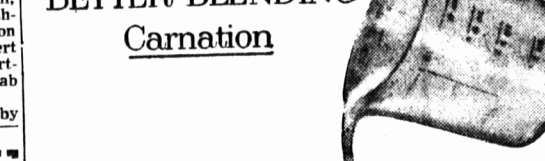

DATE NUT LOAF

1 cup of dates
1 teaspoon of soda
1 cup of boiling water
Sprinkle soda over dates and pour water over dates and stand.
Now cream 1 large tablespoon of shortening or put butter in place of shortening.
3/4 cup of brown sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup of cut walnuts
1/2 teaspoon of salt
1 1/2 cups of flour
Add dates, stir well, pour in loaf pan and bake for 1 hour at 300 degrees F.
