SESSIONAL NOTES FROM OTTAWA

Report of the Railways Department

ACTUAL DEFICIT—DRUMMOND RAILWAY'S CONTRIBUTION

The Prohibition Matter—Minister Fisher in the Sulks

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

OTTAWA, March 24.—The report of the Dept. of Railways was presented yesterday. Practically the deficit on Government railways last year was \$461,956. The actual working expenses was \$139,000, to which is added \$70,000 for four months operations of the Drummond County railway; a capital expenditure of \$352,756 on account of the operations of that line.

The debate on the address was continued by Stensen, Caagrain, Talbot, Craig, Brodeur, Osler, Britton and Moore.

Mr. Craig, who is an ardent prohibitionist, agreed that the recent vote did not justify the introduction of a prohibitory bill; but he was firmly convinced that the prohibition party had been tricked by the Government.

Hon Mr. Fisher is still in the sulks. He was again absent from his place in the House yesterday.

The Senate will adjourn to-day until April 5th.

British Policy in China.

LONDON, March 22.—In the course of a discussion of the Government's policy in China, Mr. William St. John Broderick, Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, defended the plan of dealing direct with the Tung-li Yamen, and declared the suggestion that Great Britain should instead "go straight to other powers," absolutely untenable in the present condition of affairs. After asserting that Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, in his public declarations respecting the best course to pursue, did not represent the views of the Government, Mr. Broderick said:—"We ought to be most careful lest we step into the position of having insisted on concessions, or having undertaken the reorganization of the Chinese army and navy that we do not by these successive steps undertake the responsibility for the whole Government of China." Referring to North China, he said Great Britain was still hopeful of an understanding with Russia there, and that a friendly and conciliatory disposition existed on both sides.

Austrian Conversions.

VIENNA, March 22.—Further conversions from Roman Catholicism to Protestantism are reported in large numbers from Upper Austria, Bohemia, Styria and the Tyrol. One Protestant pastor at Graz has within the last three months confirmed over 6,000 new members of his church who were formerly Catholics. Quite a number of young Catholic priests are among those who have gone over to Protestantism. The movement is spreading with astonishing rapidity.

OTTAWA, March 24.—The caucus of Conservative members yesterday was largely attended and was of a most enthusiastic character.

Monk, M. P., for Jacques Cartier, occupied the chair.

Sir Charles Tupper in a brilliant speech referred to the policy of the Conservative party as outlined by him in his address in the House on Monday.

Addresses were delivered by members representing every portion of the Dominion, all of whom spoke in the most hopeful manner of the prospects of the party.

Henry Dalby, Conservative organizer for Quebec, and S. Barker, of Hamilton, who were present, dealt with the question of organization.

The meeting throughout was interesting and harmonious, and speaks well for the future of the party.

Camera Leads to Gaol.

BERLIN, March 22.—A court in Altona has just passed sentence on Photographers Wilcke and Priester, who without permission took a picture of the late ex-Chancellor Bismarck on his death bed. For the principal part in the transaction Wilcke will be imprisoned for six months; for connivance, Forester Spozrcke is sentenced to five months in gaol, while Priester, the other photographer, gets off with three months' imprisonment.

The Alaska Boundary.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The British Ambassador, Sir Julian Pauncefote, conferred today with Secretary Hay in reference to it is understood, to a modus vivendi to be observed along the Alaska border, in order to obviate the possibility of a clash pending the final determination of the border. The need of this has been emphasized within the last few days by reports of a battle between the Canadians and the Americans, prospectors on the Porcupine river.

GIBRALTAR, March 22.—As the Spanish squadron commanded by Admiral Camera was leaving Gibraltar bay, it was met near Algeiras by the United States cruiser Raleigh, which is returning home from Manila. The Raleigh ran up the Spanish flag, and the Spanish Admiral replied by hoisting the Stars and Stripes. This is the first act of international courtesy between the United States and Spain in European waters since the outbreak of the war.
