LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

BATTALION TROPHY.—The trophy won by the 82nd Battalion team in the Military Rifle League competition, is on view in the show window of Johnson & Johnson's uptown store.

COUNCIL OF WOMEN.—At a meeting of ladies held in the Y. M. C. A., yesterday afternoon it was decided to form a Local Council of Women. Provisional officers were appointed to complete the organization.

SUCCESSFUL BAZAAR.—The Convent bazaar and fancy sale, which closed in Summerside, on Tuesday evening last, was a grand success, the handsome sum of \$230, net, being realized, a result upon which all concerned are to be congratulated.

THE CARSON CONTEST.—A large audience which included several of the gentler sex witnessed Dan Stuart's veriscope reproduction of the Corbett-Fitzsimmons contest in the Opera House last evening. The pictures were very well projected, and gave the audience a pretty good idea of the great battle for the world's championship.

ANOTHER EXHIBITION.—The Nova Scotia exhibition commission has decided to hold an exhibition next year, opening September 24th. Six thousand dollars was voted for special attractions. The deficit on this year's exhibition will reach twenty thousand dollars, ten thousand on current account and ten thousand over the expenditure on capital account.

C. M. B. A.—The fourth anniversary of the establishment of Branch 216, C. M. B. A., Summerside, was celebrated with a grand concert in the Branch Hall on Wednesday evening last. According to the Agriculturist every number on the programme pleased the audience immensely. The Misses Murphy and Mr. William Murphy, of Charlottetown, took a leading part in the entertainment.

CHILD BURNED.—An accident which terminated fatally occurred at Annapolis, N. S., a few days ago, the victim being the two-year old child of Mr. James Gallagher. It seems while the mother was out of the house on an errand the little one got hold of matches, which becoming lighted, set fire to the child's clothing, burning the body and face terribly. The child lingered in agony till noon next day when death ended her sufferings.

HORSE KILLED.—On Thursday morning last, a young mare belonging to Mr. Murdoch Macleod, Summerside, met with a sudden death. Somehow or other she got clear of him near the Court House, and came down street on the full jump, with a road cart attached. At Strong's corner the vehicle struck a cart with full force and was quickly overturned. As the road cart upset it threw the mare, which rolled right over, when her head struck the sidewalk with great violence, killing her instantly.—Agriculturist.

NEWS NOTES

The C. P. R. has filed plans for a new entrance to Ottawa by the west bank of the Rideau canal.

Fresh discoveries of gold in the Klondyke are reported by Mr Ogilvie, on creeks tributary to Indian River.

Archbishop Machray, who has been ill in England, continues to improve, and expects to return to Canada after Christmas.

At Christians, Sweden, it is reported from Vardoe that a whaling ship sighted Andre's balloon floating in the ocean on Sept. 23rd near Prince Charles Promontory, Spitzbergen.

Hydrophobia, causing death, was communicated to a Paris young woman lately by her pet dog lapping her face before it was observed that it had gone mad. The doctors could find no trace of a bite.

It is understood that Sir Louis Davies is in communication with the Imperial authorities regarding the date of the renewal of the sealing conference, which will be continued at Washington some time after the 10th of November.

A cure for the Klondyke gold fever has been discovered by an American who recently returned from Alaska. "Pick out a morning next winter," he says, "when the mercury is below zero, shoulder a pick, and go into the woods before breakfast; dig a hole sixteen feet deep; come back to the house at night and eat a small piece of stewed buffalo robe, and sleep in the woods. Repeat the dose as often as necessary."

Norway and Sweden seem to have a strong hold on the British wood pulp and paper market. Norway last year took £894,264 and Sweden £591,497 for wood pulp supplies to that country; and the year's imports into Great Britain of paper from Norway reached £348,198, and from Sweden £392,310. These amounts give a total of £2,226,200 sterling. The total wood pulp and paper trade of the United States for seven months of the past year was about one-fifth of that amount.

The death of George M. Pullman recalls a story told about his adventure with Abraham Lincoln. In the early days of sleeping cars two men slept in one berth. One day a tall, lanky man engaged a berth from Pullman handed him the check and said:—"I shall sell the other check to that berth to another man of course." The lanky man wound himself up to his full weight, then unwound himself again. "Young man," he said, "the person who can get into one of your berths when I am wound up in it is welcome to the accommodation." The man was Abraham Lincoln.
