

**Local and Other Items.**

Hon. Judge Young is in St. John.  
 Sir Leonard Tilley will leave St. John on Tuesday morning for Ottawa.  
 A very good attendance at the market today.—Prices unchanged.  
 An article on the opening of the P. E. Island Pottery will appear to-morrow.  
 Sir Charles Tupper is at St. Petersburg, Ont., and will be entertained at Supper in the Hoffman House.  
 A member of the Victoria Rifles has been arrested for refusing to parade on the 22nd of May, by order of the Colonel.  
 Pastor D. G. Macdonald will (D. V.) preach in the Baptist Chapel in this City, on Lord's day next, at 11 a. m. and 6 1/2 p. m.  
 Smoke Myrtle Navy—at Rubin & Hart's.  
 Capt. Jordan, of the Canadian Cricket Team, now in England, has been arrested as a deserter from the Horse Guards, eight years ago.  
 During the month of May last 6,912 head of cattle and 1,630 sheep were shipped from Montreal to Great Britain, an increase of 300 per cent. over any previous month since the export of cattle trade commenced.  
 The fire alarm was sounded at nine o'clock this morning for a fire which accidentally caught in the roof of Heartz's old tannery on Euston Street. The fire was extinguished before any damage was done.  
 The "Anglia," the pioneer steamship of the new Anchor Line (branch between London, Halifax and Boston, left Halifax for Boston last night, taking 1822 cases of lobsters for England.

 To Dog Fanciers.—We learn that over one hundred and fifty names have been handed to the Clerk of the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, and that one hundred and fifty, or more persons, will be summoned for non-payment of dog tax.  
 Cricket.—A scratch match will be played to-morrow afternoon at Victoria Park between the members of the Phoenix Club. It is requested that every member of the Club, who possibly can, be present, as business of importance to the Club will be discussed, before or after the game.  
 The habit practiced by small, and sometimes grown boys of setting off fire crackers is becoming altogether too common. The danger resulting from such conduct is great. If a few of the gamins were arrested and punished, it would, probably, put a stop to their fun.  
 Mr. Van Buskirk has just returned to Halifax from an extensive gold prospecting tour on the head waters of Ship Harbor, River Gold Lake and Seraggy Lake, country, East Halifax. He reports the discovery of rich alluvial deposits, and the whole country is an immense gold field.  
 Messrs. George W. Owen & Co., Auckland, New Zealand, agents for the brig "Annabella," advise Hon. D. Davies that the brig had arrived at Adelaide, Australia, with a cargo of oats from Lyttleton, New Zealand, and was chartered to carry a general cargo from Adelaide to Auckland.  
 John O'Rosaman, Esq., J. P., owner of "Abdallah Messenger," writes to the Journal, that he will give a prize of \$30, to be trotted for at the next fall meeting at Kensington Driving Park, for "Abdallah" colts, half-mile heats, best 2 in 3 to harness, of which due notice will be given.

 The Gladstone Government is alive to the necessity of making full provision for the relief of Irish distress, should the measures already adopted prove inadequate, a bill is to be introduced into the British Parliament to set aside for the purpose named, from the Irish Church surplus fund, £750,000, or £1,500,000 if necessary.  
 The brig Willie, Clarke, owned by Hon. John Lefurgey, arrived at this port on Thursday morning last, from Baltimore, in ballast. She is being loaded by her owner with oats for the old country market. When this cargo is completed Mr. Lefurgey will have shipped over 100,000 bushels of oats this spring.—*Summerside Journal.*  
 Smoke fine cut Tobacco, from Rubin & Hart, on Queen Street.  
 Larceny.—Yesterday John Doyle, alias "Cornagoose," was arrested by the police for stealing a copper urn and jar from Mr. George Coombs. He was tried by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, and was sentenced to six months imprisonment with hard labor. John is an old offender, and passes the greatest part of his life in jail for larceny. He is but 15 years of age.  
 Wallace Ross has made an exhibition of himself before the Bostonians. On Tuesday he failed to hear the word to start in his projected race with Frenchy Johnson, and to put the climax on the matter, he afterwards took part in a free fight with the negro. Boat-racing, viewed from the Ross standpoint, is certainly not a very ennobling sport. Ross was always known as a lubber; he has now proved himself a rowdy.  
 The Island steamers carried the following freight from Summerside during the past week:—Per *St. Lawrence*, on May 27th, 94 cases eggs, 3 horses, 37 bbls oysters, 1140 lbs. leather; 23th, 52 cases eggs, 25 bbls. oysters, 200 lbs. grass seed; 29th, 39 bbls and 12 cases eggs, 1 horse. Per *Princess of Wales*, on 31st, 22 bbls. oysters, 85 cases eggs; June 1st, 139 cases eggs; 27 bbls. oysters, 2 horses, 1 bbl. brant; 2nd, 55 cases eggs, 20 head cattle, 2 horses, 1 bbl. brant.—Total value, \$3,530.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

PARIS, June 2.  
 Koechlin has gone to Geneva to fight Rochefort. The police are making an inquiry into the affair of young Rochefort. They have examined eight witnesses, whose testimony mostly bears against the charges made by Richardson.  
 VIENNA, June 2.  
 It is said that China has given an important order for rifles here.  
 Monsignor Jacobini has been authorized by the Vatican to publish the entire correspondence with Bismarck.  
 ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.  
 Towards the end of the summer there will be a trial of the persons implicated in the explosion at the Winter Palace. This will clear up the question of the arrest of Shevitch.  
 TEHRAN, June 2.  
 The Persian Government refuses to interfere in the Tekke question, or to accept the proffered allegiance of the new Turcomans.  
 BERLIN, June 2.  
 Over 10,000 citizens of Altona have joined in a protest to the Bundesrath against the proposed enclosure of the town in the Zollverein.  
 LONDON, June 2.  
 It is stated that Parnell intends to press to the division Mr. Lawson's motion in favor of the recall of Sir Bartle Frere, should Mr. Lawson not proceed with the motion.  
 MADRID, June 2.  
 The Government has ordered its representative at Monherred to sign a treaty of peace and friendship between Spain and Paraguay.  
 ROME, June 2.  
 In the Deputies, four of the Constitution- alists, elected members of the budget committee, refused to serve.  
 DUBLIN, June 2.  
 The Mansion House relief committee, having received £2,688 since the last meeting, has decided to postpone for a fortnight the winding up of their affairs.  
 LONDON, June 2.  
 Captain Venet, at Queenstown, from Demerara, reports that on 30th April, in lat. 30 deg. north, lon. 60 deg. west, he passed a raft, apparently made on a man-of-war or first class steamer; it was belted together, not lashed, and two days after, saw several corpses dressed in white.  
 BERLIN, June 2.  
 The conference on the Greek question is not likely to meet before July. Ad will probably depend on the result of Mr. Goschen's mission to Pera.
