



AIR CADETS GREETED AT SUMMERSIDE

Two M.C.A. aircraft landed approximately 250 air cadets at the Summerside Air Station yesterday afternoon. They will undergo two weeks training. Squadron represented on yesterday's flights were Fredericton, Petit Rocher and Salisbury, N.B., with others slated to arrive later in the day from other Maritime points. W/C E. W. Rhoda, officer commanding the cadet summer camp is seen greeting Cadet Joel Kitchen of the Salisbury squadron as the youths descend from the aircraft. Also on hand were several other officers, including S/L H. E. Boyman, Halifax, air cadet liaison officer and public relations officer, F.O. Ray Wright. This is the first cadet summer camp to be held at RCAF Station Summerside in nine years.

147 TEACHERS ENROLLED

PWC Summer School Has Doubled Attendance

The attendance at the Prince of Wales College summer school has increased 100 per cent over last year according to Deputy Minister and Director of Education, Malcolm MacKenzie.

He reports that 147 teachers are enrolled. Of these, 28 are taking Grade XII English, 50 are taking Grade XII algebra, Grade XII chemistry, 26 Latin 7 and History 28.

Those taking the Grade XII subjects are teachers who now hold a 2nd class license and are seeking a first class license.

The second group of teachers are those who are seeking to improve their first class A license to a superior license. All of them are registered in three-year courses as follows: English, 25; Zoology I, 21; Education I, 46.

Still another group is taking teacher training subjects. The subjects with the number of teachers taking each one are as follows: Methods I A and B, 23; Methods II, 43; Language II, 40; Language III, 21; Science II, 35; Science I and III, 45.

Mr. MacKenzie said he was more than pleased with the enrollment as well as with the enthusiasm shown by those taking the course. He credits the inclusion of academic courses for the increase in enrollment. These courses permit the teacher to get university credits which in some cases will lead to a degree.

The director of education notes that summer schools have become increasingly popular among teachers who are given an opportunity to increase their professional standing and still remain on the job throughout the year.

In addition to the 147 registered at PWC, quite a number of Island teachers are registered for the summer course at St. Dunstan's and at mainland universities.

There are 850 teachers on the Island, including about 25 specialists in the field of music, home economics, manual training and physical education. Considering the total number attending summer school, it represents a high percentage of the profession as a whole.

S'ide Legion Lets Contact

SUMMERSIDE — The new Canadian Legion Home in Summerside will be built by M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd., with Inman Plumbing and Heating Ltd. receiving the contract for plumbing, heating and wiring.

This has been announced by the Legion executive and the total value of the contracts is estimated at close to \$130,000.

The new Legion Home will be built on the site of the present provincial government garage at the corner of Cedar and Notre Dame Streets. The new garage is being erected on the Pope Road on property which the Legion obtained from the Town Council and turned over to the government.

Room for banquet hall, lounges, recreation rooms, kitchen and catering facilities, and room for Sea Cadet and Air Cadet use are being included in the plans for the new Legion building.

The sod turning ceremony is scheduled for Saturday and the building is expected to be completed by next February.

P.E.I. Said Second In Construction

The total value of construction in the Maritime provinces is up 16 percent over 1958, J.E. Harrington of Montreal told delegates attending the Canadian Construction Association Atlantic Regional Convention at St. Andrews, N.B. recently.

He noted that New Brunswick has the best this year with an estimated per capita construction expenditure of \$335. P.E.I. follows with \$291, with the extensive roads and bridges program on the Island constituting an important factor.

Nova Scotia is next with an estimated \$267 but this, he said, should rise as a result of the new \$40 million pulp mill to be built at Mulgrave. Newfoundland's figure per person is \$186, or a little more than two-thirds of the average outlay of \$270 per person in the Atlantic region.

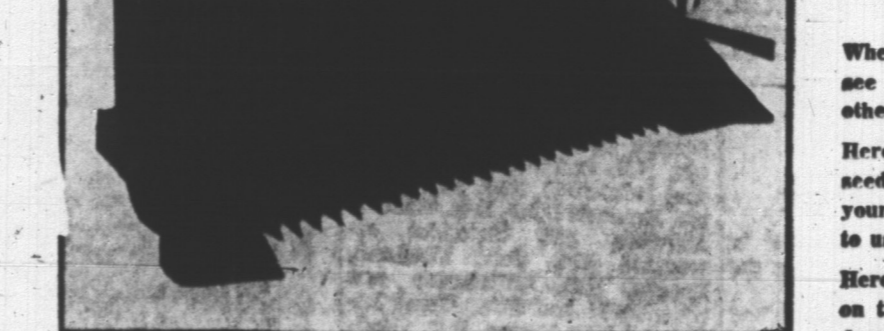

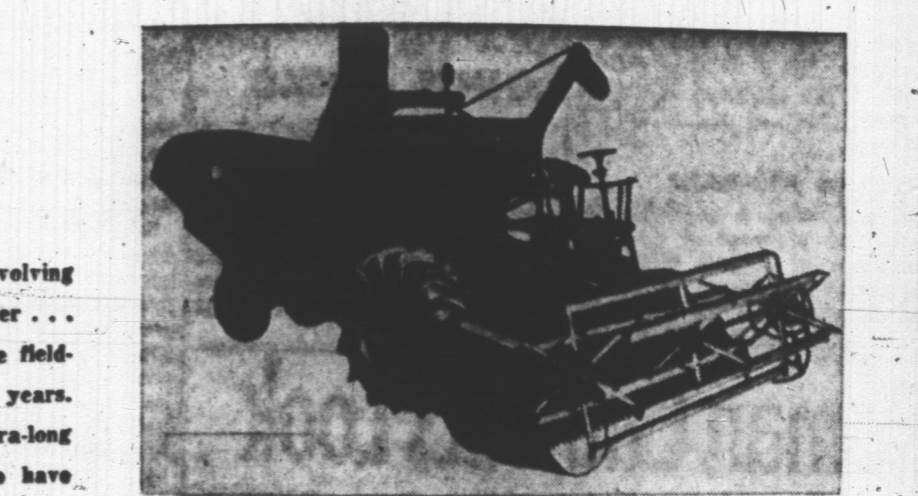
