NEW YORK

NEW YORK (AP) — In a turbulent pre-Easter weekend session, the stock market Thursday made its sixth straight daily advance.
Volume was 9,660,000 shares compared with 9,250,000 Wednesday.

The ticker tape ran four minutes late on the New York exchange as a number of the glamor stocks in color television, aerospace, electronics, airlines and office equipments made their biggest strides of the day.

The wide gains by some of the high-flyers was counterbalanced by weakness among a number of blue chips represented in the popular averages.

American Telephone fell 1/4 to 42 1/2 after selling at a high of 60. Fractional losses were taken by General Motors, Chrysler, U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Standard Oil New Jersey, Texaco and Union Carbide Du Pont lost 1/2.

The Dow Jones industrial gained 5 1/2 to 945.76. The Associated Press average advanced 5 1/2 to 349.6.

REPORTS RECORD SALES
Radio Corp. reported record sales and earnings for a first quarter and advanced 1/2 to 56 1/2.

Transitron was the most active stock, up 2 1/2 to 19 1/2 at 189,300 shares.

Among Canadian stocks, International Nickel advanced 1/2 to 27 1/2. Walkers Seagrams was off 1/2 to 23 1/2 and Canadian Pacific 3/4 to 23 1/2.

Prices were irregularly higher on the American Stock Exchange. Security Rainbow oil gained 1/2. Canadian Javelin was up 1/2 and Preston Mines off 1/2.

MONTREAL
MONTREAL (CP) — Stocks levelled Thursday, following Wednesday's slight dip in the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges.

Banks and the machinery section were off, but all other sections moved as prices rallied in early afternoon dealings.

Advances outnumbered declines 92 to 78 as the composite index rose 0.56 to 160.16.

Industrial volume was 173,000 shares and oils 786,500 compared with 122,000 and 785,000 Wednesday.

Papers led the upward trend as the index climbed 1.00 to 122.69. Price Index jumped 3/4 to 45 1/2 and MacMillan Bloedel and Powell River 1/2 to 27 1/2.

INDEX UP 0.78
The industrial index was up 0.79 to 168.10. Utilities added 0.27 to 148.11. Interprovincial Pipe Line and Quebec Telephone rose 1/2 to 82 1/2 and 25 1/2. Bell Telephone and Brinco advanced 1/2 to 56 1/2 and 5 1/2.

Banks fell 0.21 to 123.80. Senior metals moved higher. In the base section International Nickel jumped 1/2 to 104 1/2 and Hollinger 1/2 to 25 1/2. A major primary loss was Aluminum added 1/2 to 43 and Canada Iron 1/2 to 24 1/2.

Senior oils moved higher. Imperial advanced 1/2 to 53 1/2 and B.A. 1/2 to 32. Husky and Pacific Petroleum climbed 1/2 to 13 1/2 and 12 1/2.

TORONTO (CP) — New Senator-Rouyn and Peel-Elder continued to dominate trading on the Toronto Stock Exchange Thursday as prices advanced in most major sections.

New Senator gained 4 to 58 cents on 1,534,000 shares while Peel-Elder dipped 1/4 to 25 1/2 on 57,839. The companies are joint owners of a sulphur prospect near Truro, N.S.

The main list, Dominion Textile climbed 1/4 to 37 1/2, Clairmonte 1/2 to 8 1/2, Bank of Montreal 1/2 to 62, and Aluminum 1/2 to 43.

Labrador Mining paced vase metals, gaining 1/4 to 34. Pine Point added 1/2 to 62, Denison and Comico 1/2 to 43 1/2 and 43 1/2. Campbell Chibougamau lost 1/2 to 11.

Among Western Oils, Banff Oil and Canadian Industrial Gas and Oil rose 1/2 each to 19 and 12 1/2. Home Oil and Seury Rainbow 1/2 each to 19 and 25 1/2. Central Del Rio was off 1/2 to 11 1/2.

D. Eldon slid 1/2 to 68 cents on 625,517 shares in speculative activity while Cam Mines moved up 1/2 to 45 cents.

On index, industrials were up .65 to 170.60, golds .82 to 170.61, base metals .49 to 92.08 and the TSE .61 to 161.39. Western oils eased off .11 to 108.19. Volume was 6,379,000 shares compared with 7,962,000 Wednesday.
