Intersection Alterations Are Studied

Highways Minister Philip Matheson said yesterday that his department's engineers are still considering possible changes to the St. Peter's Road - Brackley Point road intersection which it is hoped will result in a smoother flow of traffic.

Traffic expert Larry Mannel of Municipal Services Limited, Oakville, Ont., recently studied the traffic problem at the intersection and made a recommendation to the highways department. The recommendation suggested that Belvedere Avenue and Gordon Drive be joined by a piece of highway that would cross the wedge-shaped area made by the junction of St. Peter's Road and the Brackley Point Road.

Shooting Case Results In Suspended Sentence

GEORGETOWN — Francis McLellan, Newport had sentence suspended for two years and entered into a bond to the amount of \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each when he appeared before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, charged with causing bodily harm to Harold Donald Campbell of Newport by shooting him with a shotgun.

McLellan who was represented by G. R. Foster, QC, had, at an earlier sitting of the court, changed his plea to one of guilty.

In all cases before the court the Crown was represented by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McDougall.

CASE DISMISSED Harry Daniel Murphy, Montague, represented by S. S. Hessian, QC, had a charge of impaired driving against him dismissed by the court. A total of five Crown witnesses were heard in the case.

AN aggressive bid to promote greater consumer recognition of Atlantic Provinces food products, the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council, working in co-operation with regional food processors, has prepared a number of attractive food display panels. Over 29 firms have booked space in this year's initial project. The aim of the program is to make Atlantic Provinces food brands names better known. By developing an awareness of regionally produced brands it is hoped that greater consumer demand will be created for Atlantic products—thus stimulating this facet of the economy. Nelson Mann, APEC executive vice-president, points out that the suggestion to support Atlantic Canada's food industry is neither an appeal to protection-
