NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The statement of the public debt at the close of February shows:—

Table with 2 columns: Item, Amount. Gross debt: \$93,491,294. Assets: \$1,608,931.

Net: \$24,883,263. This is a decrease of \$50,088 during the month, but an increase of \$2,222 since the close of the fiscal year.

This increase is more than accounted for by the expenditure on public works chargeable to capital, which, for the eight months, has been \$2,237,518.

Dominion lands, 91,500. Railways subsidies, 1,093,654. Total, \$3,332,360.

This shows an increase of \$531,360 in public works (mostly on the Saint Ste. Marie and Southlands canals), \$533,312 in railway subsidies, and \$26,663 in Dominion lands, or a total of \$1,121,335.

The statement of revenue and expenditures for the month of February, and for the eight months of the fiscal year, which appears in the last Canada Gazette, shows that the policy of caution which has been pursued by importers for some months past is only importing what is needed for immediate consumption.

For the eight months the revenue has been \$21,056,219, which is \$411,873 less than for the same period last year, but is \$503,739 more than the revenue for the first eight months of the fiscal year 1891-92.

The expenditure for the month of February was \$2,240,564, and for the eight months \$21,532,464, which is \$159,763 more than for the same period last year, but \$36,263 less than the expenditure for the first eight months of the fiscal year 1891-92.

The present surplus is \$2,454,055, which is \$961,606 less than the surplus at this time last year, but \$549,099 more than it was at the same time in the previous year.
