Day in, day out association, on a friendly basis, such as you've had, is a far better test of compatibility than dates in an aphrodisiac atmosphere.

As of now, you are interested in aphrodisiac sampling. A good you aren't accustomed to be refused when you ask for dates. So the present frustration bothers you. Frankly, I rather hope you fall in your campaign to date this girl.
