### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

It is remarkable that not a single Canadian politician is found among the recipients of the Queen's birthday honours.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that the fact that such Liberal papers as Le Soleil are opposed to an early election is a sign that will not be mistaken. If the Laurier Government's work had commended itself to the people during the four years of its continuance there would be no call for delay to fix things up. The opinion that settles the fate of ministers is not made in the caucus room before a campaign.

A western paper thinks it is remarkable that when the political morality of the Dominion is advancing to a decidedly higher plane, the most immoral Government should be in office. The Montreal Gazette remarks that a little deeper thought would have made the conjunction of the two facts seem reasonable. The shock created by the revelations of what "the machine" has done has roused the dormant sense of decency in the public mind. Laurierism is providing its own cure.

One who knows Sir Charles Tupper well writes concerning him: "Sir Charles is really a wonderful personality. After all these years of hard campaigning, he is as bright as man can be. Intellectually he has no superior in Parliamentary life. Physically, he is as strong as he was forty years ago. No doubt the secret of his happily prolonged activity is the correctness of his habits. ### CRONJE CAGED.

Sir,—In the Patriot of April 19th there appeared an article claiming to be a reply to the letter of "Valleyfield" in THE EXAMINER of the 6th of April. Poor foolish scribbler, it would be much better for him to have left good enough alone, for not only did his disconnected sentences prove that "Valleyfield" was strictly correct but he leaves the subject of the new road open to more criticism. It was not enough for him to reply to "Valleyfield" but he thought himself big enough to attack the whole Tory press of Canada and accuse them of falsehoods and misrepresentation.

He says that work was commenced on the new road a month before the election. This is absolutely untrue. The work was sold by the supervisor subject to the approval of the C. P. W. and the contractors never got word to begin the work till two days before the election. This is a lie for the Whim Road Cross scribbler, but not lie No. 1.

He then goes on to say that the supervisor's brother did not buy John Lemon out but was simply a sub-contractor. If so we would like to see John Lemon over his own name say so, and we would believe him. But such is not the case, as it can easily be proved that John Lemon was not responsible to the Government for the completion of the work but the supervisor's brother; and he could well afford to pay Mr. Lemon a snug sum when his brother was inspector and his hired man, etc.

Then he says that Mr. Murdock Matheson was inspector. This is again false as Mr. Matheson never saw the bridge yet, either when finished or while under construction; if the books of the department show that Mr. Matheson was paid for inspecting this bridge we greatly fear that some one else got the money. This Whim Road Cross scribble could not deny that the frame sills were bolted to the pebbles and stones in the bed of the river instead of mud sills, and he forgot to tell that after the Government bought and paid for the right-of-way the first owners of the land cut down all the lumber and sold some of it at two or three dollars a tree for piles to go in Montague bridge. A Government work. He also forgot to tell that after spending upwards of one thousand dollars for this mile and a half of road it is still impassable. To this we draw the attention of James R. McLean, C. P. W., and hope to see him out soon and see that teams can travel safely over this road. If it was wanted at all why not make it passable?

As for the last item in this notorious letter, when he states that "suspicion pointed strongly to some Tory miscreants who might be assisting the floods to destroy the bridge." I have only to say that this looks very much like the angry concocting of the family Compact & Co., when out of excuses—or it may have originated in the unclean bosom of a man who would himself in the dark hours of the silent midnight cross to his neighbor's and injure his property. Try again Cronje.

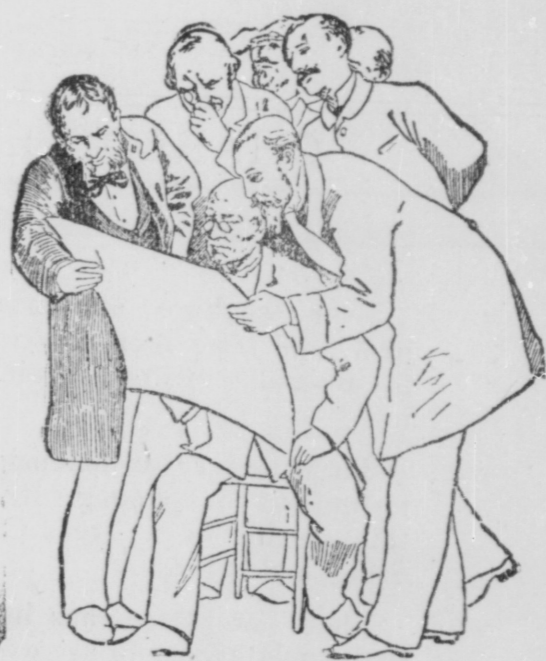
"There is no flock however watched and tended,
