Noteworthy Career Of Former P. E. Islander

The following account of the career of the late Mr. John Goodwill MacPhail, who died at Ottawa on Wednesday last, is from the Ottawa Journal: "One of a distinguished Prince Edward Island family, Mr. MacPhail was born in Orwell, P. E. I., in 1877. He was educated at the Uiz Grammar School and Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown. "Coming to Ottawa in 1905 following his graduation as bachelor of science in civil engineering at Queen's University, he joined the staff of the Commissioner of Lights, Marine Department, as chief engineer. "For the three years succeeding his appointment he was engaged on various lighthouse surveys and engineering work over a wide field. In 1908 the office of Commissioner of Lights became vacant, and he was placed in charge as acting commissioner. He was appointed commissioner in 1911. "Mr. MacPhail's scientific and technical training, and his practical experience, enabled him to take advantage of the advancement in science which commenced to transform the Lighthouse Service in 1905, and it is largely due to his initiative and untiring work over a period of more than 40 years that the Canadian Lighthouse Service is today recognized as one of the most efficient in the world. "In spite of his heavy administrative duties, there were many occasions when he undertook urgent and difficult work in the field, including salvage and submarine cable operation, especially during World War I. "He was promoted to the position of Director of Marine Services in 1940, and he was also chairman of the Lighthouse Board of Canada. "By his careful and wise expenditure as an administrative officer, Mr. MacPhail saved the Canadian government many thousands of dollars annually, without in any way impairing the efficiency of the Service. "He represented the Government at international conventions on Lighthouse Service Affairs in Canada, the United States and

Will Take U. S. Dollars At Par At Travel Bureau

United States dollars will be accepted at par from American visitors purchasing fishing or hunting licenses at the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau, it has been announced by George V. Fraser, Director of the Provincial Government Tourist and Information Bureau here. Regardless of exchange rates, the American dollar will be accepted at its full face value from United States visitors buying either license. Americans and other visitors to Prince Edward Island can fish for speckled and sea trout in the Province for a yearly license of only three dollars. A non-resident hunting license, which gives the holder the privilege of hunting the Island's excellent game birds, is only \$35 a year. The Provincial Department of Industry and Natural Resources will follow the same policy as the Travel Bureau in respect to the payment in American funds for licenses. The various R. C. M. P. officers and other places where licenses are sold for the department will be instructed to accept U. S. currency at face value.

Honoured By King

"In 1943 his outstanding contributions to the Government service were recognized when his name appeared in the King's Birthday Honors List in June. He was made a Companion of the Imperial Service Order. Previously he received 'Their Majesties' Silver Jubilee Medal and Their Majesties' Coronation Medal. "Widely read and a student of history, Mr. Macphail contributed many articles to scientific and engineering journals. "He was also the author of one book, 'St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, the First Hundred Years,' published in 1931. Primarily a history of St. Andrew's Church, it forms a valuable contribution to the history of Ottawa from Bytown days, and was widely and favorably reviewed. "Taking an active interest in the affairs of Queen's University, Mr. Macphail was president of the Queen's Alumni Association of Ottawa for several years. In 1918 he was made a member of the Board of Trustees of the University and a member of the Management Committee. "A Presbyterian, Mr. Macphail was a member of St. Andrew's Church and took an active part in its work. In 1918 he was elevated to the Eldership, later becoming Senior Elder. In 1932 he represented the congregation of St. Andrew's as Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, held in London, Ont.

Single Department

"In 1936, his responsibilities were increased when the Department of Railways and Canals and the Department of Marine were amalgamated to form the Department of Transport. As chief of Aids to Navigation, his duties included the supervision of some seven Harbor Commissions, 300 public harbors and 2,000 Government wharves. "He was promoted to the position of Director of Marine Services in 1940, and he was also chairman of the Lighthouse Board of Canada.
