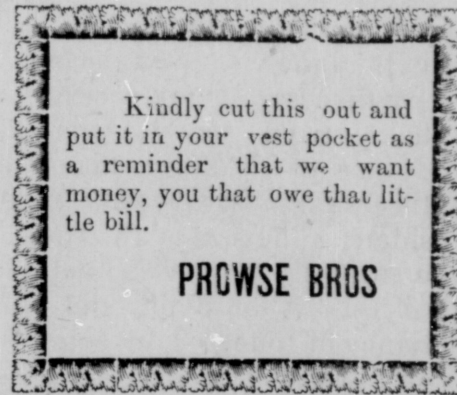

DEATH IN A KISS.—What appears to be a remarkable case was recorded recently, according to a Paris despatch, when a young girl named Mlle. Santasiero died of hydrophobia, all-ged to have been caused by the contact of her lips with the tongue of a pet dog. She had a small terrier, which one day refused food and drink from its mistress, snapped at her, but did not bite. The veterinarian sent for recognized hydrophobia, and the dog was killed. A fortnight later Mlle. Santasiero affected the same symptoms that preceded the death of her pet, and her last moments were terrible. She refused to kiss her friends lest she might communicate the disease to them. Dr. Chailion, of the Pasteur Institute, unhesitatingly expressed the opinion that the disease was communicated in the manner supposed by the poor girl. The slightest contact of the tongue of a mad dog with the mucous membrane is sufficient to cause hydrophobia.

LAI D TO REST.—The remains of Mr. George Thorne were today laid to rest. The funeral left his late residence and proceeded to St. Paul's Church where, services were conducted, then to the People's Cemetery. The pall bearers were Mr. John Elliott, Mr. Geo. Simmons, Mr. Wm. Small, Mr. P. S. Brown, Mr. Geo. E. Hughes and Mr. Joseph Warren. In losing Mr. Thorne we lose one of our most upright and honored citizens. Showing at all times a cordial and open-hearted disposition he crept into the hearts of all with whom he came in contact, both in social and business relations. All day Saturday, although not feeling well, he continued his usual duties; but when the evening came his work was laid aside never to be resumed. His last hours were hours of intense suffering, and despite medical attendance and loving care the "Angel of Death" gained the victory. He died trusting in the mercy of his Redeemer. He leaves a widow and five children to mourn the loss of an indulgent and kind husband and father.

The passing away of the venerable editor of the Sun, will cause no change in the editorial policy. It is announced on competent authority that Paul Dana, the only son of Mr. C. A. Dana, who has long been connected with the paper, will succeed to the office made vacant by the death of his father. While Mr. Dana did not control the stock of the paper, he owned a large share, and this, together with that owned by his close friends and supporters, gave him practical control of the publication. It was always his wish that his son should succeed him, and it is certain that his wish will be gratified.
