Sales Tax Seen Hitting Blow At Lumbermen

OTTAWA (CP) - L. G. McKimmins, president of the Canadian Lumbermen's Association, said Wednesday the government's revised application of the sales tax on building materials and production machinery would result in a sharp drop in the lumber and allied industries.

He added that many small operators would be forced out of business.

The remarks were included in a letter sent by Mr. McKimmins to Finance Minister Gordon. Copies were issued by the association to the press.

The letter says the association's officers expressed unanimous disappointment and deep concern over the latest budget changes "not only for our industry, but for the future economy of Canada."

"The imposition of sales tax on production machinery cannot do other than halt the recent movement toward expansion and modernization belatedly taking place in the lumber business," the letter says.

"Anyone foolish enough to proceed will incur additional costs which must wipe out the

RCAF Crash Kills Three

COLD LAKE, ALTA. (CP) - A pilot and two crew members were killed Wednesday after a C-119 crash landed at a small airfield near Cold Lake, Alberta, RCAF officials here said.
