Annual Highland Games Yesterday At Antigonish

ANTIGONISH, N.S. (CP)—Several records fell Wednesday as Antigonish athletes walked off with both junior and senior honors at the annual Highland Games here under a blazing sun.

Antigonish Highland Society topped the senior events with a point total of 60. Halifax Navy was second with 43. Halifax Wanderers had 15. Bridgetown 14 and Glace Bay fire department 5.

Jim Carruthers of Navy was top individual senior scorer with 15 points. Jim Sears and Thompson of Antigonish each had 11.

A strong Antigonish team walked off with the junior meet, collecting 41 points to top second-place Middleton by seven points.

But the standout in the junior meet was Max Keeping of Halifax Wanderers who collected all 12 points credited to his team.

He won the 100-yard dash, the high jump and placed third in the broad jump. The performance made him the high individual scorer among the juniors.

Bridgetown scored 24 points, Glace Bay 12, Wanderers 12, Hansport 5 and Dartmouth 3.

In the senior events, two records fell early in the day. Bill Haley of Wanderers broke a 220-yard record in 22 seconds. The old mark was 22.4.

The caber toss record was broken twice. Joe Chisholm of Antigonish clipped an inch off the mark with a toss of 38ft. 9 in. and then team-mate Len Thompson bettered that with a toss of 39ft. 1 in.

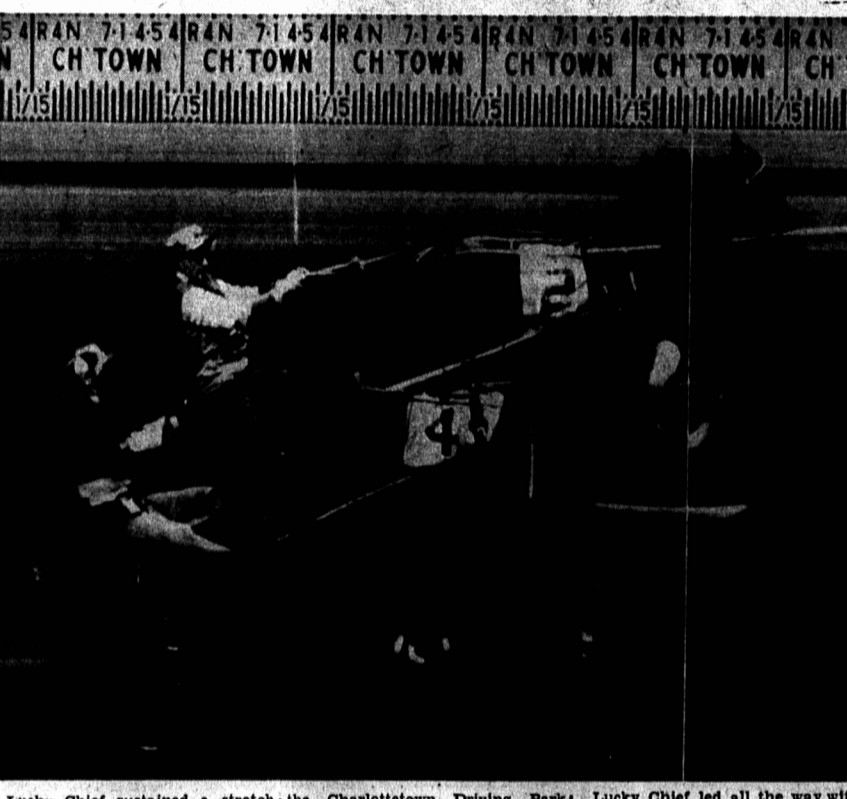
