



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The latest Horseman and Fair World contains summaries of the racing at Dufferin track, Toronto, and we notice where Maritime drivers are winning a share of the firsts. A Classified Pace purse \$200 was won by Homeward, driven by Jack Quinn of Charlottetown, time 2:22 2/5. A classified trot, purse \$300, one heat at a mile and the other at 1 1/16 miles, was won by Columbus Hanover, also driven by Jack Quinn, summary 2-1, time, 2:18 4/5, 2:27 2/5. Quinn also drove Pablo Hanover at similar distances in a \$300 trot, winning both heats, time, 2:17 4/5, 2:24 2/5. Later in the meeting he won the classified trot, purse \$400, 1/2 furlongs, being first both heats with French Song, time, 2:04 3/5, 2:04. He headed some of the best trotters racing at Dufferin. A couple of days afterwards he won a heat with Pablo Hanover, Pat Wynn with driver Jimmie Cruise winning the other. Jackie is driving a number of the Ed Jones stable at Dufferin while Ed is located at Saratoga. We were glad to notice in the summary that Wilkin, owned by Richard Jabale, North Sydney, and driven by Don Ratchford, won a classified pace from a good field of pacers in 2:22 1/5. Actually time does not mean very much at Dufferin as some days the track will be from 8 to 10 seconds slow. The performance of French Song in Quinn's hands seems to show him as being very speedy to get away from such trotters as Projectile, etc.

Cecil H. McGinley of Houlton, Maine, remembers us with the following letter: "Enclosed you will find some information on Woodstock, N.B. races that will appear in the Saturday Bangor News horse notes. I wonder did you see in the last Harness Horse the account of the fire at Morris Sullivan's stable in Mars Hill, Me. The two Federal fillies that were destroyed were two I sold untrained to Arthur Schenk of Springfield, Mass., a couple of years ago. Louise Federal was out of Elsie Louise 2:11 1/4 and was second in 2:18 last summer on the trot. Jeanne Federal was out of Jeanne Truax 2:08 1/4 and

some of our local horsemen who saw her race at Foxboro last fall said that she could pace very fast and should take a low record some day. John Kelly of Bangor and Bob Ryan took a trip over to Springhill, N. S., a week ago to look at a Calumet Budlong colt out of the dam of Colonel Dan, but they did not buy.

"Here are the Woodstock notes... Owners of race horses and sulky race fans will be interested to learn that the Woodstock Driving Club is making plans for the coming summer, following the first successful night racing program held at the Island night racing held at the Island Park in Woodstock was popular with many residents of north-eastern Maine and New Brunswick. Eighteen meets were run off and eight others scheduled were cancelled due to inclement weather. Officials of the driving club have announced that over eighty horses participated in the night racing program with a total of \$23,620 being distributed in prizes.

"Many local horses have wintered at the Island Park stables and several new horses were purchased during the fall sales and will be ready to see action when the 1932 season rolls around. Included in the list of new horses bought since the close of the 1931 season are: N. D. Hal 2:05 and Card Shark 2:08, owned by W. N. Stiles of Woodstock; Skeller 2:07, owned by R. R. "Buddy" MacEachern, formerly of Charlottetown came close to pulling one of the biggest upsets in the Olympic games when his Swedish coached team came within 20 seconds of earning a draw with the Edmonton Mercurys yesterday. For the 33 year old Charlottetown born player and coach, yesterday's showing was one of the finest of his career. MacEachern played with the Sydney Millionaires a decade ago when that team lost to Regina in the Allan Cup finals in seven games.

Jack "Spy" Ready, better known as a hockey player than a coach, but now coach of the Prince of Wales College team made something in the way of hockey history in the province when he pulled off his goaltender seven times in the last period during the game against King's College last night. He first pulled the goalie with about 10 minutes left in the game and the score reading 1-0 in favor of Kings. The first time his move filled most of the students with suspense, caused bystanders to shake their heads about the soundness of the shift and although it failed to produce a shot on the Kings net, it caused considerable excitement.

Following a face-off in the P. W. C. end goaltender Simmonds returned to his net only to be recalled when the play moved up the ice. This was repeated again and for the third time neither team scored. Then shortly after Simmonds had returned to his net Bouchard of the visitors intercepted a pass-out and scored from directly in front of the cage to make it 2-0. Down two goals and still willing to gamble Ready kept pulling his goalie and the move finally paid off when Cleo Gillis scored with less than two minutes left in the game.

As it turned out the move didn't win the game for Coach Ready but it didn't lose it for him either and it caused a lot of excitement for the fans, most of whom were students. Goalties have occasionally been pulled in the game but it happens very seldom. It did occur once in Vancouver last year. The master showman Murph Chamberlain was coaching the Canucks and his team were behind 1-0 in the middle of the first period. The move backfired and the opposition scored. Murph explained afterwards that if the move had worked the Canucks might had got enough lift to go and win. The game ended 8-0 in favor of the opposition.

The local collegians were stumped by the goaltending of young Gordon T. Veit. The visitors also had an outstanding defenseman in the person of Don MacDonald who hails from Gloucester. Last year MacDonald reportedly played several games with the Windsor Maple Leafs in the Valley League. He is big and fast and a very nice rushing defenseman.

Referees Jack Kane and Art Perry did a good job on the whistles. There was one dispute early in the third period when a Prince of Wales shot struck the goal post. The goal judge did not flash the red light and referee Kane, who was watching the play from beside the net stated it was no goal. There was an argument and one player received a misconduct. One other remarked that there used to be a time when a fan would never see a player arguing with the referee. Lately, however, it seems to have become a habit and its trend is noticeable among the younger players. The same thing happened during the school game on Thursday night.

The Sydney Millionaires, noted for their great play when the competition is the toughest, moved two points closer to a play-off berth last night with their win against the Islanders. The Millionaires are only eight points back of the fourth place Glace Bay Miners and it was with considerable justification that coach "Bud" Polle stated that he feared the Sydney squad. The Millionaires have 20 more games to play and the Islanders 18. The two teams play one another on four more occasions, twice in the last week of the schedule. The Islanders could well decide the fate of the Millionaires.

According to Canadian Press despatch Stevie MacDonald is favored to win the Maritime Bantamweight boxing title. Before he left here for the tournament we asked MacDonald what he thought about his chances of winning and Stevie, who is a southpaw, replied that he would win if he could get his left hand across. Stevie's main fear was meeting a tall opponent whom he couldn't reach. Stevie himself stands about five feet three.

HUNTERS' CORNER

The past week has been rough. A real old fashioned winter has emerged from the misty shadows of the past and warmed the hearts of the old timers in the good old days when men were men and winters were winters. There is a lot of snow down and the most of it must be in the woods for game force vinds have accompanied the last few storms. So far as our Huns are concerned its better piled up in the woodlots than feet deep over the fields.

There is one bright spot, insofar as fishermen are concerned, for there is nothing like a few raging freshets to pen up the trout. During winters of light snowfall and few thaws the streams are low in water level and sluggish on that account. The pools become silted up and with little food moving trout are inclined to become semitropical and inactive. This winter we have experienced a number of heavy freshets with some real humdingers in the offing. Those will result in a general souping out of the pools and food, dear to a trout's heart, will be washed into the water from the surrounding land.

In swift water, especially if food is present trout become active and full of fight. A trout with its sides rounded out from heavy feeding will put a bow in the stoutest fishing rod and is a different fish from the slab-sided half dead specimens encountered some opening mornings. Come to think of it this coming Saturday will be the last in February and once March comes in a trout fisherman's temperature begins to climb. What's more the bait slinging artists will have one less day to wait—the season opens on April 15th this year. The sixteenth always was an unwanted baby.

When the creel census is completed, and this count includes upland game birds as well as trout, a big surprise is in store for many. Maybe among those receiving the biggest surprise will count among their number the ones who are always arguing that our trout fishing is through—all washed up. Here is a little glimpse behind the creel census curtain. The other day I tabulated the trout column on a sheet that held 70 names. Several guessed as to the number. The highest 3,000, the lowest 1,400. None were anywhere close to the

Millionaires Down Islanders 6 To 2

SYDNEY, N. S., Feb. 22 — (CP) — With accent on shoulder and speed, Sydney Millionaires broke out of an idle stretch of four days to rap Charlottetown Islanders 6-2 here tonight before 1,635 spectators in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

The Moneybags, chafing in home territory for a solid week, had energy to burn in the second and third periods as they erased a 2-1 Charlottetown lead.

Islanders shot their two counters in a first period burst but Sydney's Don McRae sitting out a holding penalty. The pair, fired from goal-mouth jams by Dennis Smith and Willie Marshall, took away an early Millionaire advantage given by Dunc MacIntyre who, buffeted by the visiting defence, continued through to pick the puck and fire a high shot over R. J. Frederick's shoulder.

Ron Matthews sliced through the Charlottetown blue-line guard at 4:43 of the second period with Cliff Roach's pass and blazed a shot past Frederick for the equalizer.

Twelve minutes later McRae, leading force in Millionaires' comeback, wheeled around the left side and fooled Frederick with a quick, high flip.

Uncovered, Frank Bathgate continued the trend at 1:21 of the final canto, slashing home Loren Pirie's crease pass. A three-man break with a lone Charlottetown defenceman back at 9:19 manufactured the third, with MacIntyre counting.

Five seconds before the end, with Charlottetown's Willie Marshall juggled for interference, George Robertson tossed in the sixth by converting the rebound off Bill Dinning's long shot.
