

# Hospital Survey Is Authorized

SUMMERSIDE — A survey by a firm of hospital consultants to ascertain the accommodation needs and prepare an overall plan for proposed expansion of Prince County Hospital is expected to begin around Aug. 20.

This information was revealed yesterday by the hospital board of trustees of which Justice W. E. Darby is president.

The board has approved the selection of Dr. D. F. W. Porter and associates of Fredericton and Moncton to carry out the project which is expected to take until sometime in November.

Richard S. Hinton, Q.C., chairman of the special planning committee which has been investigating the hospital problems of high occupancy and a long waiting list and other matters for several months and recommended that the firm of consultants be engaged.

Any decision to enlarge the hospital will be made only after the survey is completed and its findings thoroughly studied, it was stated.

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# Annual Award Planned For Paving Companies

Highways Minister Philip Matheson announced yesterday that his department will honor each year the asphalt paving contractor firm that produces the best riding pavement on provincial highways.

The minister said that department officials have held for years that a paving award

"would give well deserved honor to the firm producing the best pavement being laid."

After rating each of the 123 miles of pavement laid in the province in 1961, the department found that the firm of Curran and Briggs Limited won top honors. The firm name will be embossed on a shield that will be displayed in the department of Highways office. Each year a winner's name will be added to the shield.

"The problem was to pick a winner," said Mr. Matheson. "Close inspection" he went on, "ensures that all pavements meet with the specifications, so some other standard was needed."

"Based on an American method of judging the riding quality of a pavement called the PSI rating, all 1961 pavements was judged. In this method a panel of road builders rates the
