

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Aug. 8.

There was another outbreak of religious animosity at Toronto on Friday night, a riot occurring between the Young Irishmen and Orange Young Britons. It required sixty policemen to club the rioters. Several men were seriously wounded.

A Downing street circular in the *Canada Gazette* gives notice of the expiration of extradition and trade treaties between Great Britain and Honduras.

AFGHANISTAN.

BOMBAY, Aug. 7.

Private accounts agree that the inhabitants of the country between Candahar and Chamau Choki have risen, and there has been severe skirmishing around Chamau Choki.

CABUL, Aug. 7.

The Ameer has sent 700 ponies for the Amere service, and has also sent a number of prominent men to arrange for our supplies on the Candahar route.

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Aug. 8.

The troop ship "Tamar" sailed to-day for Bombay with 1,000 men, who are destined to reinforce the army in Afghanistan.

LONDON, Aug. 8.

The *Standard* has the following from Bombay: "A generally accepted rumor is current here that the Afghans have taken Chamau Choki. It is reported that 4,000 Afghans have gathered in the vicinity of Quetta. General Roberts' force has left Cabul."

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 8.

A Berlin correspondent says military preparations are the order of the day. In the Balkan Peninsula the Turks repaired and armed the fortifications of Salon. Corps continually arrive from Galipoli, some being sent north, while others remain to protect important harbors. The Montenegrins have levied on every able-bodied man. The Antwaria forts are being constructed under the superintendence of the Russian Count Solohub, a resident for some time at exposed posts. The Greek Government has invited volunteers from Thessaly and Epirus, but as yet few have come. The signal for war being expected, firm orders have been given to border brigades to stop operations until further notice. Accordingly the frontier has never enjoyed a state of more absolute order and quiet than upon the eve of war.

Neither are the Bulgarians behind hand in their warlike movements.

The dory "Little Western" is being exhibited at Westminster Aquarium.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says: The body of Ugatis, the murderer of Madame Skobeloff, and Ivanhoof, the sole witness of the assassination have mysteriously disappeared.

The floods in Silesia have subsided. They have done irreparable damage to public and private property and caused great distress.

An excursion train broke through the bridge at Waverly, Ohio, on Friday, killing one man and wounding 15 men and women.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 7.

The details of the murder of Dr. Parsons an American missionary, and his servant, near Ismid several days since, show that Dr. Parsons and servant were making a profession tour in the mountains east of Ismid and encamped on the night of the 4th inst., by a roadside in the vicinity of some Guruks of a semi-nomadic tribe. Two Murak shepherds, who have since been arrested, have confessed with cynical composure that they shot two travellers as they slept and robbed them of their money amounting to less than a pound. As Dr. Parsons did not reach his destination at the expected time and as his horses were found wandering about the hills, his friends instituted a search and their bodies were discovered under some bushes near the scene of the murder. The authorities hearing that a despatch on the subject had been sent to the British Embassy, showed more than usual zeal and arrested the criminals, but the fact of their being Mahomedans may put obstacles in the way of ordinary judicial procedure.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.

Telegraphic correspondence between the Governor of Newfoundland and the Secretary of the British Admiralty, establishes the identity of the figure head found at sea as that of the lost training ship "Atalanta."

A mob supposed to be from Tennessee went to the jail in Athens, Alabama, on Saturday night, took out Bailey, the wife murderer, and hanged him.

CHAUTAUQUA, N. Y., July 8.

At Jamestown, last night Gen. Garfield said:—"Fellow citizens, it is too late at night, and too near the first day of the week to make a speech, but I have spoken to so many people in this State as we came along to-day, to my own home, that in this place so representative of love and liberty and all that is best, in this district, so renowned, I cannot avoid saying a single word to thank you for this welcome, especially as it is so late and you have waited so long. I bid you a cordial goodnight." (Hearty applause.) Gen. Garfield was present at worship in the Amphitheatre at 11 a. m., occupying seats among the audience. Hon. O. G. Conger, Senator Kirkwood, Murat Halsted and Schuyler Colfax were also in attendance.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.

Dr. Tanner spent a quiet day to-day and saw very few visitors. His physicians say he is improving as well as can be expected.

Shortly before noon he ate a half a pound of beefsteak, and some potatoes which had been stewed in milk. He was quite lively to-day and frisked about the room like a schoolboy. His physicians says his rapid recovery from the effects of his long fast is something remarkable.

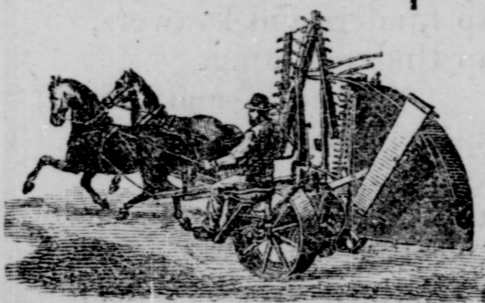
