Halifax St. Mary's In 5-3 Win Over Beavers

HALIFAX, March 12—(CP)—Halifax St. Mary's stood off a furious third period assault by Saint John Beavers tonight to win the sixth game of the Maritime Big Four Hockey League semi-final playoff round 5-3.

The Saints now lead 4-2 in the five-of-nine series. Seventh game will be played here tomorrow.

The Halifax club played their best hockey in the first period, opening a two-goal lead. They made it 3-0 at the start of the second period. Then they faded. Before they could put themselves together, the Beavers had whipped three goals past Eddie D'Aoust to deadlock the score.

Late in the period, Cy Thomas put them out front with his second goal of the night.

In the final frame, attempting to play defensive hockey and protect their one-goal lead, the locals were outplayed by a wide margin. But D'Aoust held them together.

The final period was enlivened by a dispute between Halifax goal judge George Fitzgerald and referee Reg Beazley. Beavers had claimed a goal when Paul Platz, firing from the wing, hit the post. It appeared that the puck had bounced directly back onto the crease without crossing the goal line. But the Beavers thought otherwise and argued that Fitzgerald should have flashed the light.

Beazley joined the argument and ordered the goal judge out of his coop. Penalty timer Bill Evans took over with little more than two minutes of play remaining.

Ice Heavy

The heavy, tacky sheet of ice was not to the liking of the Saints who looked leg weary by the second period.

Bill Ford made his first appearance of the series with the Saints, joining the Sullivan-Thomas line. Bert Steele moved to the "blanket line" with Diguver and Anderson. Peanuts MacLaughlin did not dress.

Beavers played without their top scorer, Buck Whitlock, who was injured Saturday night. However, it is possible Whitlock will be declared fit for tonight's game.

She was apparently finishing under wraps and her fall looked like a bit of bad luck. Still it wouldn't be wise to run races over, because the one who crosses the finish line on his or her feet deserves the victory after all.

It's a bit like life, isn't it? And if we have an occasional spill through no fault of our own, may we get up and grin as the little girl did at Crystal Rink Friday night.

Buck Whitlock Wins League Scoring Race; Trainer Tops Assists

Buck Whitlock, Mr. Maritime Hockey, has taken the scoring championship of the Maritime Major Hockey League for the third time in four years.

Official statistics released yesterday show the Saint John Beavers' ace racked up a season high of 57 goals and added 69 assists to take points honors with 126.

Billy Watson of Halifax Saint Mary's held runner-up position with 45 goals and 70 assists for 115 points.

Charlottetown Islanders had a man in the first three weeks. "Bucko" Trainer with 98 points, Nick Nicolle of Saint John was fourth with 95 points and Paul Platz held fifth spot for Beavers, totalling 94 points.

Islanders ended the season scheduled with a league-leading 102 points. Halifax had 83 for runner-up position and Beavers held third with 75. Moncton Hawks had 46 points.

Charlottetown's Hal Gordon had the best goalkeepers record. His average was 4.62. Eddie D'Aoust of Halifax was second with a 3.33 average and Dennis Brodeur of Saint John averaged 3.95 for third place. Moncton's Les Colvin had an average of 4.81.

Islanders led the penalties division, totalling 1,560 minutes. Halifax came next with 827 and Beavers racked up 799 minutes in the sin-bin. Moncton served 437 minutes.
