P.E.I. Provincial Secretary Announces Appointments

Hon. George Dewar, provincial secretary, yesterday announced the appointment of Rev. Dr. Francis Bolger and Rev. Henry Tye as co-chairmen of the Prince Edward Island Committee of the Canadian Inter-Faith Conference.

A meeting of the P.E.I. Committee, comprising lay people as well as clergy, in the Confederation Centre last night was addressed by Mrs. Evaline Gilstraf, of Ottawa, executive director of the Canadian Inter-Faith Conference.

In September 1965, the formation of the Canadian Inter-Faith Council was announced. This organization, which is providing leadership in the field of inter-denominational co-operation, has had official support and participation by the Catholic Church, virtually all Protestant denominations, the Orthodox churches and the Jewish and Islamic communities.

Mrs. Gilstraf's contribution to this venture has been recognized by her appointment to its board of directors, and subsequently as of January 6th, the executive director.

Mrs. Gilstraf, who prefers to be known as Eve, hails from Winnipeg. Formerly a photographer, she was active in Canadian Girls in Training and other youth groups.

She moved to Ottawa in 1953 as a technical assistant to the Dental Consultant at the Department of National Health and Welfare and in 1959, the Ottawa Civic Hospital claimed her as registrar of the School of Nursing.

In addressing last night's meeting, Mrs. Gilstraf mentioned that representatives from each of 29 faith groups in Canada will meet at the Chateau Laurier on April 26 and 27 to plan a national wide religious observance for Canada's Centennial year.

WILL CONSIDER

The two-day meeting of the Canadian Inter-Faith Conference will consider how best to "promote a greater understanding... and develop mutual respect and cordiality between leaders and members of various faith groups," for the 1967 Centennial celebrations.

Island Gains 122 People

OTTAWA — Prince Edward Island had a net population gain of 122 people in February the dominion bureau of statistics reports. In the month there were 195 births and 73 deaths. The figures compare with 164 births and 75 deaths in February of 1965. The number of marriages showed a substantial increase to 42 compared with only 19 the year before. For the first two months of 1966 the number of P.E.I. births was 347 compared to 37 for January and February of 1965. Deaths rose to 181 from 173 and marriages increased to 66 from 46.

Negotiations Carried On

OTTAWA — Negotiations are still being carried on between the federal and provincial governments with respect to second national park in Prince Edward Island.

Northern affairs minister Arthur Laing informed David MacDonald, MP for Prince that an offer of land had been made by provincial government. The offer was made on May 19 last year for land that is situated in the West Point area of Prince County. No indication was given as to when the negotiations would be completed.

Dirt Roads Impassable

MONTAGUE — The conditions of the roads that the school buses must travel are still considered to be impassable and the Montague Regional High School will remain closed for another day. The students missed classes yesterday due to poor rural road conditions, but it is hoped the conditions will improve and classes will resume on Wednesday.

This year the students have missed very little time due to immobility of the buses and it is felt that this temporary suspension of classes will not interfere in the school's program.

In the past years the buses have been very successful in delivering the students to school in the spring. It has been more than four years since a general cancellation due to mud.

Farmers Meeting Asks For Subsidy

A subsidy to help finance the purchase of fertilizer applied to hay, pasture and grain crops, and free disinfecting of custom machinery used in potato planting was asked at a meeting of farmers last night in the Legion hall at New Haven. Knud Jorgensen, Fredericton, president of the Queens County Federation of Agriculture presided.

During the discussion on fertilizer subsidy, John A. Rodd, Milton said farmers in this province are subsidized now in effect because Austin Scales has refused to raise the price of fertilizer.

"I was told last year at a meeting in Moncton," Mr. Rodd told the meeting "that the price of fertilizer would be five dollars per ton higher, if it was not for the fact that Mr. Scales refuses to raise the price," and other people in the business stay in line with his prices he added.

The meeting failed to agree on a resolution that asked the provincial government to leave the potato seed planting operation next year the same as it is this year. This would permit planting tablestock, along with a seed plot, as has been granted for this year to island farmers. The meeting split down the middle on this resolution and Chairman Jorgensen did not cast a deciding ballot.

RECOMMENDATIONS

George Howatt, French River who is president of the Potato Producers Association said his group is making recommendations.

"It now is expanding considerably as a market for Canadian manufactured goods of all descriptions and exporters are coming to realize that Britain holds promise of becoming a major outlet for their goods.

"According to the national plan issued recently by the British government, it is in the manufactured field that British imports are expected to increase to the greatest extent.

"However, it is in this field that the mission found the greatest evidence of a lack of attention on the part of Canadian exporters to British customs requirements and procedures."

"The mission found that fundamental changes are taking place in the British transportation industry and the marketing of goods in Britain, and there are indications that the tempo of these changes will accelerate within the next few years," the report said.

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Ottawa And London Planning Anglo-Canadian Trade Boost

OTTAWA (CP)—Both British and Canadian authorities last week announced plans to promote more Anglo-Canadian trade.

Sir Henry Lintott, British high commissioner, announced trade promotion plans extending far into 1968 in an effort to encourage Canadians to buy more British goods.

Among his plans is a British week to be celebrated in Toronto in the autumn of 1968. In addition to British goods for consumer use, the plan involves bringing out to Canada the best of British theatre, music and the visual arts, and making it a gay time for all.

Canada's effort to boost sales in Britain had a much more prosaic ring.

A group of Canadian government officials and businessmen who visited Britain last fall issued their report on some of the difficulties Canadian exporters may run into in trying to get their goods onto the British market.

This was in the mundane field of ocean shipping, port handling facilities on the other side, customs clearance, and road and rail transport within the United Kingdom.

"A quality product at a competitive price is not in itself sufficient to sell in an export market," said the report of the Canadian export shipments mission to Britain. "Goods must be delivered in satisfactory condition, on time, properly documented, and using the most productive distribution techniques."

One of the advantages Canadian goods can have entering Britain, which is not available to non-Commonwealth countries such as the United States, is the preferential tariff treatment for Commonwealth goods.

But the report says that unless Canadian exporters are careful about filling in the necessary documents, they may lose this advantage.

For instance, there are forms which have to be completed to show the amount of Canadian content in the goods. It's not all right simply to bring American goods into Canada, add a few finishing touches, and send them off to Britain as Canadian goods.

MANY CONSIDERATIONS

A lot depends on material handling techniques. One thing the new Canadian exporter to Britain frequently overlooks is the smaller size of railway cars and highway trucks used in Britain. There is also a wide variety of port-handling and intermodal transportation rates to be considered.

In general, the report said, the prospects for increasing Canadian sales in Britain are good.
