Dr. MacKinnon Denies Rumors Of Appointment

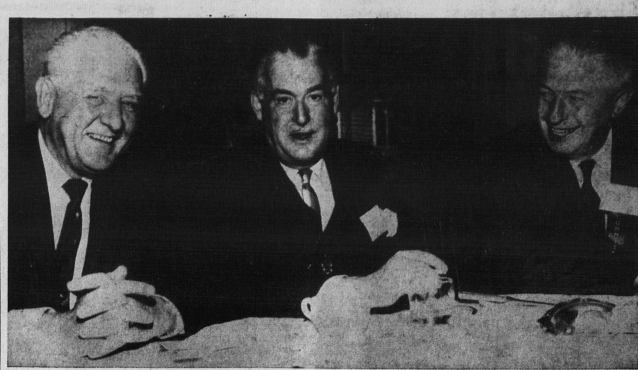
