Summerside Business Man Missing On Flight

Robert Holman Piloting Small Plane Unreported In Montreal-Megantic Hop

MONTREAL, Feb. 7.—(CP)—A small single-engine two seater Fleet Canuck airplane is missing en route from Cartierville Airport here to Megantic, Quebec. An official of Cartierville Airport said the plane took off at 11 a. m. today. He said the pilot's name was "Holman." He did not know the man's first name. Holman told airport officials early today that he bought the plane in Toronto and flew it to Montreal last night. He said he intended flying his aircraft home. Officials said he would have to stop at Megantic, Que., to refuel. A report from Quebec City said the plane was last reported this afternoon at 3.15 flying between St. John's and Chamby, Que. (In Toronto, Leavens Brothers Air Services said they sold a plane the other day to Robert Holman of Summerside, P. E. I., who planned to fly it east.) On his flight from Toronto he was accompanied by a woman instructor. She returned by air to Toronto early today. (At Halifax Search and Rescue said they understood that plans for a search were being made by Search and Rescue at Trenton, Ontario. However, there was no definite information on search plans.)

Buckingham Palace To Be Queen's Residence

LONDON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—The official residence of Queen Elizabeth II will be Buckingham Palace in the heart of London. But it is expected that many months will pass before she moves from Clarence House, a few yards down the Mall from the palace. The death of the King will certainly involve many other changes in personal arrangements of members of the Royal Family. It is regarded as certain, however, that changes will be made slowly and only after exhaustive family consultations in which the new

LONDON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—British one quietly welcomed home their new Queen today and heard her first minister, Winston Churchill, wish her long life and fortuitous reign. Elizabeth II returned from equatorial Africa to the London she left as a Princess a week ago and took up the burdens of a crown which Churchill described in a broadcast as "the magic link" uniting the British Commonwealth of nations, states and races. Prime Minister Churchill, who has served every British monarch since he was an army officer under Queen Victoria, eulogized the late King in his broadcast to the

Total Of 3,386,208 Bushels Of Seed Potato Crop Shipped

N. S. Drama Festival Opens

HALIFAX, Feb. 7.—(CP)—The Nova Scotia Regional Drama Festival opened here today with a matinee performance of Oscar Wilde's "Trivial Comedy for Serious People—The Importance Of Being Earnest" and an evening presentation of the tragedy "Hedda Gabler." The Wilde comedy, presented by the Robert Alban Players of Halifax, a theatre-in-the-round group, drew qualified praise from adjudicator Pierre Lefevre. The in-the-round medium, however, is not eligible for competition in the Dominion finals to be held in Saint John, N.B., in April. Truro Community Players' presentation of the Ibsen tragedy, he said, "failed to arouse that deep human interest in the characters which the playwright tried to give us." The players were out of their depth, resulting in a "slight portrayal of a very great play." The festival continues until Saturday.

President Truman Extends Sympathy

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—(CP)—President Truman has extended to Canada the sympathies of himself and the American people on the death of the King. This message from Mr. Truman was sent to Chief Justice Thibault: "For myself and on behalf of the American people I extend to Your Excellency sincere condolences upon the death of His Majesty King George. His loss will be deeply felt throughout the world." The Chief Justice, acting as administrator in the absence of a governor-general, replied: "On behalf of the people of Canada I thank you Mr. President and the American people for your kind message of sympathy in the great loss we have sustained. We deeply mourn the death of the King who was greatly loved by all Canadians."

Manitoba Had Small Surplus

WINNIPEG, Feb. 7.—(CP)—Manitoba had a surplus of \$1,769,830 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1951. It was disclosed today as the 1950-51 public accounts for the province were tabled in the Legislature by Political Treasurer Ron D. Turner. The surplus, lowest since the year ending March 31, 1941, resulted from total revenues of \$55,481,566, compared with expenditures of \$53,721,625.

French Premier Gets Vote Of Confidence

PARIS, Feb. 8.—(Friday)—(AP)—Premier Edgar Faure's government squeezed through on a vote of confidence in the National Assembly early today. He took over the leadership three weeks ago.

Friday, Feb. 15 Day Of Mourning

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.—(CP)—The Federal Cabinet today issued a proclamation declaring Friday, Feb. 15, the day of the King's funeral, a public holiday to be observed by all Canadians "as a day of general mourning." In Ottawa, the day will be observed by a national ceremony at 3 p.m. at the National War Memorial on Confederation Square, with Prime Minister St. Laurent placing a wreath for the people of Canada. Members of the Diplomatic Corps and representatives of national organizations will attend.

N. S. Legislature Opening Delayed

HALIFAX, Feb. 7.—(CP)—Opening of the Nova Scotia Legislature will be delayed one week until Feb. 19 because of the death of King George VI. Premier Angus L. Macdonald announced.

B. C. Seeking To Float Loan In N. Y.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 7.—(CP)—British Columbia is trying to borrow \$25,000,000 from the American market in New York. It was learned today. The money is required for the B. C. Power Commission and founding of treasury bills into bonds. Last year, \$25,000,000 was borrowed in New York by former Finance Minister Herbert Morrison.

Suggest Shearing Schools For Sheep Husbandry In P.E.I.

Shearing schools in Prince Edward Island, where a number of the necessary husbandry practices in sheep production would be illustrated, was suggested as a matter for immediate consideration by Mr. H. W. Clay, senior livestock fieldman, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in reporting to the Agricultural Council conference now sitting in Charlottetown. Mr. Clay pointed out that the sheep population in the Province is being increased yearly, but the necessary good husbandry practices "are woefully absent in too many of these newer flocks." He also pointed out that the old dipping tanks have disappeared nearly entirely, that rotation of pastures is not possible in most areas and that worm treatment is not used nearly enough, although the Provincial Department assumes part of the cost price of the worm capsules. Queen Elizabeth Assumes New Duties As Sovereign

LONDON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Pale but dry-eyed, Queen Elizabeth II today took up her lonely duties as sovereign of a people mourning with her the death of her father. The 25-year-old Queen, who arrived at London Airport under a leaden sky after a 4,000-mile flight from Kenya Colony, Africa. With her was her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh, who she is expected to proclaim prince consort. Prime Minister Churchill bowed deeply in greeting as Britain's new Queen and her royal party stepped from the big four-engine plane. After speaking briefly to the welcoming party and to the crew of her plane, the sorrowing Queen was whisked in a motor convoy along police-lined roads to Clarence House, her London residence, and thence to Buckingham Palace.

Newfoundland's 1913 election act, still in force, requires all ballot boxes to be collected at the central district returning office before counting begins. icy roads in rural districts delayed collection of boxes until late tonight and returning officer Joseph Fitzgibbon said a long checking job had to be completed before counting could begin. Polls opened at 8 A.M. and closed at 8 P.M. N.S.T. Candidates in the two-way contest were Resources Minister Arthur Johnson and Progressive Conservative Malcolm M. Hollett.

HITCH-ALIBING SPARROWS

PORT ALBERT, B. C., Feb. 7.—(CP)—A dozen hitch-hiking sparrows arrived here today from Chatham, Ont. The birds fluttered out of a box car when it arrived in this Vancouver Island west-coast city, 75 miles from Vancouver. The sparrows travelled in a car loaded with automobiles. The journey took three weeks.

Assumed Full Responsibilities
