WILL PROCLAIM

Production Speed-up "At the same time, we will have a very rapid speed-up in the production of military equipment. Within one year, we will be turning out planes at five times the present rate of production..." Truman appealed to Congress to enact an excess profits tax at this session of Congress, and said that "still further taxes will be needed."

He disclosed he has instructed Government officials to prepare increased tax recommendations as nearly as possible on a "pay-as-you-go basis."

He has called for reduction of non-military expenditures in the budget to be submitted in January to the minimum required for effective support of the defence effort. He said that restrictions on credit buying, higher taxes and reduced non-military expenditures "are our primary defence against inflation" but direct measures will supplement them "to keep prices in line."

The President warned that there will be changes in the life of nearly everyone in the U.S. since it must produce "more steel, more copper, more aluminum, more electric power, more cotton, more of many other things."

Workers will have to labor longer hours, he said, women and older men will be needed in plants and factories.

The President conceded that "aggression has won a military advantage in Korea" and that "we should not try to hide or explain away that fact."

In brief form what he proposed to do: "First, we will continue to uphold, and if necessary to defend with arms, the principles of the United Nations—the principles of freedom and justice."

"Second, we will continue to work with the other free nations to strengthen our combined defenses."

"Third, we will build up our own army, navy and air force, and make more weapons for ourselves and our allies."

"Fourth, we will expand our economy and keep it on an even keel."

Says Sex Perverts Easy Marks For Spies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 — (AP) — A Senate investigating committee today described sexual perverts as easy marks for foreign spies and said many Federal agencies have been lax about routing such perverts out of Government jobs.

The group reported that in general it found "the same shortcomings and delinquencies" in the handling of the problem among congressional employees as it did with respect to workers in the executive branch of the Government.

In report to the Senate, an expenditures sub-committee singled out the State Department for particular criticism. That agency, the group declared, "mishandled" 91 homosexual cases by allowing many of the employees to resign "for personal reasons" and failing to bar them from other Federal jobs.
