

Yankees' matinee factory

New York Yankees crushed Chicago White Sox in both ends of a doubleheader Sunday in their American League lead to 10½ games, the biggest margin they have enjoyed in nearly two years.

Despite the loss of a home-town crowd of 44,000, the Sox never came close in either contest, leaving 19 men on base in the first and second innings from the second inning in the nightcap.

Minnesota Twins backed into a second-place tie with the Sox as the last-place Washington Senators scored four runs in the seventh inning to defeat them 7-3 in a single.

Kansas City Athletics outlasted Baltimore Orioles, defeated Tigers nipped Los Angeles Angels 3-2 and Cleveland Indians outgashed Boston Red Sox in the rest of the day's activity.

Ralph Terry, winning his 14th game, and Jim Bouton, taking the loss, both pitched well against the White Sox but the Yankees were never behind all night as 1½ stretches stretched their margin to the greatest they have held since they twice won 11½ in September, 1961.

Tom Kubek, returning from three days' absence with an injured foot, had two hits and a walk in the opener and scored twice. Three hits by Bobby Richardson, a homer by Hector Lopez and Johnny Damon helped the Yankees to a 7-0 victory over the White Sox.

A twin bill featuring Earl Warren and Elston Howard's homer

put New York in front in the second game and the Yankees wrapped it up in the ninth with a four-run rally aided by an error and a passed ball.

An error by relief pitcher Gary Roggenbuck proved the Twins' undoing in the seventh inning. His misplay of a bunt allowed the bases with one out and Don Leppert eventually smashed a three-run homer.
