## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### The Subway.

SIR,—In the last number of the New York Engineering and Mining Journal, there appears an article entitled, "A New Method of Laying Submarine Tunnels and Tubes," by Richard P. Rothwell, Esq., which article, we are told in a foot note, was read at the Pittsburg meeting of the American Institute of Mining Engineers, February, 1886.

Mr. Rothwell begins by saying: "The device to which I desire to call the attention of the members of the Institute consists of a water-tight caisson, which is connected by a stuffing box with the tube to be laid, and the caisson is pushed forward by hydraulic jacks set against the end of the tube. The tube is of hard white iron, cast in chills in segments. These segments are carried from shore through the tube itself, in which a track is laid as the work progresses, and the segments are bolted together in the caisson, where there is ample room to work and proper appliances for handling heavy weights. As each segment is bolted on, the jacks are set against its forward end, and when the whole ring is complete the caisson is pushed forward by the jacks, a trench having been dredged out in front of it. The direction in which the caisson is pushed is completely under control, and both the caisson and the tube are loaded to the amount necessary to overcome their buoyancy.

I understand that negotiations are now under way for the construction of a 16 foot tunnel of this kind across the Straits of Northumberland, between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland, and for tunnels in several other places.

Then follow two illustrations showing the general design and method of laying this submarine tunnel. One of these illustrations is an exact picture of the model shown by Senator Howland in his lecturing tour. Who the inventor of this submarine tunnel is we are not informed by Mr. Rothwell; though he says he had devised a similar contrivance about fifteen years ago. The patentee is a Mr. H. H. Hall, of New York. Mr. Rothwell thinks "that a tunnel of this kind could in most cases be laid at a small part of the cost of an ordinary tunnel. The iron segments may be cast at the furnace, and would therefore cost little more than pig iron, and the operation of putting the segments together is simple and inexpensive.

It appears to me possible to apply this new method of tunnel laying without serious difficulty, and with great economy where the local conditions are favorable.

It will be seen by this that the scheme proposed by Senator Howland is not the mere dream of a theorist, but a scheme declared to be feasible by prominent engineers both in Canada and the United States. We hope soon to see it assume practical shape in the building of the subway across the Straits.

Montreal has decided to substitute a poll tax of \$2 for statute labor.

Bradford, England, is suffering from a very serious mad dog scare.

Mrs. R. M. Davidson and David Rice, of Lee County, Ia., have taken out a license to marry. He is 81 years old and she a year younger.

A strike in the McKean factory at Salem, Mass., has been caused by valentines which passed between some of the women employed in the factory.

Kenneth McKenzie died at Wallace, N. S., on the 7th inst., aged one hundred and three years. He was undoubtedly the oldest man in the Maritime Provinces.

"Beavers in Fall Creek, Kan., have cut down one hundred trees for this winter, some of them eighteen inches in diameter, floated some of the logs nearly a mile down stream and built a complete dam across the creek."

Nearly all the inmates of the Lebanon, Ill., County almshouse have been poisoned by drinking coffee which contained Paris green, placed therein by unknown parties. All the patients have recovered but two, who may die.

"Women, my boy," said an old Peoria parent to his son, "are a delusion and a snare." "It is queer," murmured the boy, "how some people will hug a delusion." And while the old man looked queerly at him the young man hunted up his roller skates and went out to be snared.

New York's law of debtor and creditor is fearfully and wonderfully made. Twenty-six years ago Joseph Beaver contracted a debt of \$100, which he has never since been able to pay, but, up to a few days since, he was permitted to remain at large under sentence of committal, he giving security for the amount. His bondsmen at length declined to be any longer responsible and the officers of the court thrust him into prison for the balance of his life if the debt is not paid.

## Boston Markets.

BOSTON, March 13.

POTATOES.—The liberal accumulation for foreign potatoes, with a slow demand, has caused a weak and unsettled market. Occasional lots of magnams are held a trifle above quotations, with some holders talking of storing; but others are inclined to urge sales, and we hear of free offerings on the dock at \$1.75 per bag. Champions are not so plentiful as Magnum, but the tone weaker in sympathy. Nova Scotia potatoes in light supply and prime held about steady, but the demand is not so sharp and a slight increase in the supply would probably weaken prices. State potatoes continue plenty and very dull, with prices weak and irregular. Sweetens are dull and unchanged. Really choice are held up to \$2.50, but more offering at \$2.25 than above.

FISH.—Dealers report a good jobbing movement in mackerel and codfish, and the outlook is quite encouraging, though the demand for round lots is still rather light. Large fat No. 1 and extra No. 2 are in demand, but other kinds are slow. Codfish are selling fairly at \$2.37½ and \$2.50 for large pickle cured Bank and \$3 to \$3.25 for large dry.

Eggs.—The market has been steady the past three days, with sales of Eastern extras at 15½ to 16c, and Western and Southern at 15c, and there has been a good demand.

## North River Notes.

The farmers are busily engaged digging mussel mud. Messrs. McKinnon and Heartz, late on Saturday evening, made some alterations in the course of digging, leaving a large opening of water exposed to the public, without putting the proper obstructions to prevent people from driving in. Early on Monday, after the snow drift had covered it, Mr. Patrick McAleer, who arrived first at the diggers, took his horse by the head to lead him to where there were some bushes for shelter, and walked in. The horse falling on top of him plunged him under, but, after a desperate struggle, he succeeded in getting clear of the horse. Messrs. McKinnon, Murchison and Robertson ran to his rescue and got him out. They took him to Captain Murchison's, where he recovered quickly. This is another instance of carelessness on the part of owners of mud-diggers in not properly bushing their cuttings.

There are great improvements both on public and private buildings. Our school houses are a credit to any settlement, and the Baptist Church has been thoroughly strengthened and received a splendid coat of paint and tinting.

Mr. John McKinlay has under way a most magnificent edifice, and judging by the pile of scantling and other building material in Mr. Donald Murchison's field, we would suppose that he is contemplating matrimony.

Black Pilot has been in retirement this winter, but indications are that he will have to defend his laurels next fall, as Mr. Morrison, of Tryon, has challenged any horse on the Island to trot his stallion for \$100 a side.

Mr. Charles Dockendorff spends his evenings in training his Hernando colt, a horse that will yet give a good account of himself. He is pronounced by competent judges to be far superior to the one sold by Mr. Dockendorff last summer.

We regret to hear that Mr. B. Dockendorff's Hernando colt met with an accident lately that will be likely to leave a permanent blemish. This is the more to be regretted as Mr. Dockendorff was about selling him for the handsome sum of \$125.

On visiting the stables of Messrs. Bain, F. White, Alex. McKinlay, H. McEwen and others, I find a number of superior fat cattle preparing for Easter show.
