THE REVIEW AT ALDERSHOT.

A Great Day for the Queen and Royal Family.

Colonial Troops in the Van.

ALDERSHOT, July 2.—The great jubilee review of troops took place yesterday. Queen's weather prevailed. The Duke of Connaught, commanding the Military District, was in supreme command of the troops who numbered 25,000 men. These men included all the colonial forces, divisions of cavalry, artillery and engineers and four divisions of infantry. In the march past the colonial troops had the lead and were headed by Lord Roberts of Kandahar, at the head of the Canadian mounted police. The Prince of Wales led the Tenth Hussars past the saluting point. Accompanying Queen Victoria were the Princess of Wales, Princess Victoria of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, Prince and Princess Charles of Denmark, the Colonial Premiers and a brilliant throng of titled spectators. The Colonial troops lined the route followed by the Queen after leaving the saluting point. The heat was intense and the crowd enormous.

LONDON, July 2.—A despatch to the Times from Constantinople says that Tewfik Pasha will announce to the ambassadors of the powers today that the cabinet maintains the indefensible right to Turkey to retain Thessaly by virtue of conquest.

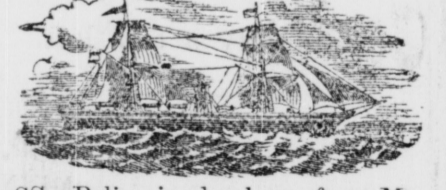
