# Cardinals Can't Flag Defeating Mets 11-5

The St. Louis Cardinals clinched their first National League pennant since 1946 on the final day of the season Sunday, whipping the New York Mets 11-5 behind the stingy relief pitching of Bob Gibson and Barney Schultz.

The Cardinals, who never were in first place this season until last Tuesday, won their 10th straight game after a 2-0 loss to Philadelphia's 10-0 bombing of the Cincinnati Reds, who were tied with St. Louis for first going into the last day.

The Phillies and Reds finished tied for second by the Cardinals' 10-0 win. When the 30,146 fans at Busch Stadium learned the game at Cincinnati was over, a thunderous roar filled the pentam air while players celebrated on the field and dotted the field.

The Cardinals, under manager Johnny Meyer, who is in his fourth season as manager, will host the New York Yankees in the first game of the World Series Wednesday.

Gibson, whose 1-0 loss in the Mets' Friday night ended an eight-game St. Louis streak, pitched four innings and limited the Mets to two hits before a wildness caused by the ninth and brought in Schultz the veteran 38-year-old knuckleballer.

# Richardson Records Denucci

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP) — Blair Richardson of nearby South Bay scored a 10-round unanimous decision over Joe Denucci of Newton Mass, in a non-title return match here Saturday night.
