

FISHING POSSIBILITIES STRESSED AT SOURIS TRADE BOARD DINNER

Speakers at the annual Souris board of Trade dinner last night saw the fishing industry—already booming in that eastern King's County area—only scratched. Several predicted great advances.

The dinner, held at the Sea View Hotel, was preceded in the afternoon by a sail on a dragger. During the brief run to sea, the operation of the craft was explained. Returning the guests, included four men from the Research Department of Fisheries at Halifax, were taken through the Eastern Fisheries filleting plant and shown the whole process from the time the fish lands until it is frozen for shipment.

The Eastern Packing Co. canning plant was next visited. Strawberries, which had been frozen earlier, were being processed here.

The next stop was at Griffin's new plant, now under construction, and then to the Griffin cannery where fall mackerel were being canned.

At the dinner Paul Gallant, president of the Souris Board of Trade was chairman. The first speaker was Mayor Arthur Peters who welcomed the guests to the town and to the dinner. He was followed by J. Brenton St. John, M.L.A., who introduced the guest speaker, Eugene Gorman of the Fishermen's Loan Board, Charlottetown.

Mr. Gorman spoke on the great

strides the fishing industry in this Province has been making, using the 1953 production figures, compared with those of previous years. "The industry was a 'sound financial investment' for anyone, he believed.

He said a recent visitor to the Province compared this island to a large boat heading into perhaps the best fishing area in the western hemisphere, rivalling even the Pacific Coast. And he said that Souris was the bow of that boat.

The possibilities of the industry here had "hardly been scratched yet."

Thomas J. K. Kickham, M.P., Souris, was the next speaker. He also referred to the great possibilities of developing the industry, and mentioned, too, the processing of Irish moss and fresh frozen vegetables.

Other speakers included Arthur W. Gaudet and J. J. Larabee, both of Charlottetown, W. A. Acorn, M.L.A., Souris and A. W. Wright, also of Souris. Mr. Acorn moved and Mr. Wright seconded a hearty vote of thanks to the guest speaker.

The meeting was then thrown open to general discussion and brief remarks were made by Peter McLellan, senior fisheries officer for the Souris district and Mr. Mullins from the fisheries research department at Halifax.

Some 60 persons attended the dinner.

Cases Heard In Georgetown Court

The following cases were heard in the magistrate's court in Georgetown yesterday:

A party from Charlottetown charged with reckless driving, under the Criminal Code, had his license suspended for six months and was fined \$35 and costs or in default of payment 30 days in jail.

A person from Village Green and another from Iris were fined \$5 or 5 days for operating a car without a license.

Under the Temperance Act a party from Eidon was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail for being in possession of liquor in other than his own premises.

A charge against a man from Gasperaux for driving while intoxicated was adjourned for one week.

A party from Montague was fined \$5 or 5 days for hunting without a license.

A man from Launching Field and another from Murray Harbor were fined \$60 and costs or 60 days in jail for driving while impaired.

A party from Cardigan charged with being intoxicated was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail.

A person from Ft. Pleasant and one from Cardigan were fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail for being in possession of liquor in other than their own premises.

A party from Peter's Road was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days in jail for being in possession of liquor and the same party charged with the same offense for a different date was again fined \$25 and costs or 30 days in jail.

A person from Abney was fined \$1 or 1 day in jail for having more than three adults in the cab of a truck.

A man from Georgetown charged with hunting game with a loaded rifle had the evidence heard and the case was adjourned for one week.

A person from Pinette charged with reckless driving was fined \$50 or 60 days in jail.
