Civil Servants Will Discuss Resources

Civil servants involved in resource development policies on both the federal and provincial level will meet this morning at the Basileia Recreation Centre in Charlottetown reportedly to discuss proposals for more economic surveys to be carried out in the province.

Chairman of the conference will be S.C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, the provincial department responsible for the workings of the agricultural rehabilitation and development program.

Expected to attend are representatives of ARDA, the federal Atlantic Development Board. Indications are that the conference will look at such proposals as a fisheries development survey, a human resource development program, a study of rural and urban development potentials, a forestry inventory of the province, a classification of land potential for recreation and an examination of the needs and requirements of the tourist industry.

ALBERTON — The proposed West Point ferry service and a second highway into Western Prince County via Freeland and Foxley to Cascumpec, both long-time projects of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade, were further discussed at the regular meeting of the board in Alberton last night.

R.A. Grindlay, secretary of the promotional committee of the West Point Ferry Co., brought the meeting up to date on the great amount of work carried out by the committee in the last four years.

A favorable traffic potential report has been given following a survey by the Maritime Transportation Commission and further preliminary reports are pending from the federal department of public works and the Atlantic Development Board Mr. Grindlay concluded.

As a means of attracting more interest and attention to the ferry proposal it was approved that a resolution be circulated among organizations and individuals requesting their support and a meeting is planned with a number of representatives of main-line boards of trade which are actively interested in a ferry service between New Brunswick and West Prince County. The meeting is expected to take place in West Prince.

The present telephone service in the area was discussed and it was approved that the secretary write the telephone company and public utilities requesting improvements.

Johnston. In 1959 he ran against Mayor W.A. Currie for the chief magistrate's office and was defeated. In the ensuing by-election he regained his West Ward council seat and remained until his recent defeat. From early 1964 until his defeat he served as deputy mayor under Mayor W.E. Jenkins.

Mr. Wood was also on the Summerside fire department for 30 years and served as fire chief from 1961 until his death. Had he lived he would have been in line for the presidency of the Maritime Fire Chiefs' Association's annual meeting in June.

He also served as secretary-treasurer of the Prince County Horsemen's Club from the time of its formation in 1960 until early this year.

Mr. Wood obtained his early education in Summerside and prior to taking up his undertaking career, took pre-medical studies at Saint Dunstan's University in Charlottetown.

Surviving, along with his brother, are his widow, the former Elizabeth MacNeill of Summerside and two daughters, Ann (Mrs. Bob Davis), Edmonton, Alta., and Margaret (Mrs. Rex Ashley), Paris, Ont. and one son, Tommy, at home.

The remains are resting at the Bonness Funeral Home until Saturday morning. They then will be transferred to St. Paul's Church here for Requiem High Mass at 9 a.m. Interment will take place in the church cemetery.

Everyone A Salesman Tourist Ass'n Is Told

The tourist industry is the biggest single international business today, and is the major single category in international exchange of money said N. Murray Brown, president of the Canadian Tourist Association at the conclusion of the semi-annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Tourist Association at a dinner in the Charlottetown Hotel last evening.

"In Canada, we are just beginning to recognize the importance of tourism. We have a large and growing industry, but as yet we are merely scratching the surface of our potential."

He went on to say that last year, foreign visitors to Canada spent \$651 million here, and tourism was thus the third biggest industry, after newspaper and wheat, as a foreign dollar earner. This was a gain of eight percent over the previous year.

He said "every one of these new dollars circulates throughout the economy, and turns over slightly more than three times within a year, adding about six or seven percent to our gross national income."

BIGGEST TRAVELLERS
Canadians are regarded as the world's biggest international travellers, spending over \$700 million outside of their own country. United States citizens spend between 30 and 50 billion dollars annually on travel, both within and outside their own borders.

External tourism for Canada is promoted by 10 provincial travel bureaus and two territories, by regions and cities, and transportation companies and operators in the industry. The Maritime provinces travel bureaus have the enviable reputation of spending more per capita on tourist promotion than any other province in Canada, he said.

Mr. Brown said "to augment this program, each and every one of us can be a salesman for Canada to tourists, and by little things such as giving directions and whatever information we can when these welcome strangers cross our paths."

"If they are well received, they will tell others about us and word of mouth endorsement is the best possible recommendation."

He further stated "we must convince ourselves, our southern neighbors and our friends in every part of the world, that while we may be a nation with varied cultural traditions and backgrounds, we are nonetheless, one great nation with one great objective — the making of a still greater Canada for those who will follow us."
