THE OUTGOING GOVERNMENT.

On the 23rd of June a majority of the people asked, constitutionally, by their votes, for a change of Government; and on the 8th July—a fortnight and a day afterwards—the Liberal-Conservative Government resigned office.

THE INCOMING GOVERNMENT.

Mr. LAURIER has been, throughout the Government-General, as Premier of Canada, he will ere long assume the names of those whom he has chosen to share with him the responsibility of advising the Queen's representative and carrying on the Government of this large country.

AN INSIDE VIEW.

The telegraphic correspondent of the New York Sun, at Montreal, has the best means of learning the causes of Mr. Laurier's movements and the influences which control his policy.

This is a decidedly interesting view of the situation. The correspondent writes: "It is rumored that Mr. Laurier has promised the banks that he will hold a short session of Parliament and pass the estimates and appoint a committee to investigate and report upon the Manitoba school question, and then prorogue Parliament."

June, and the country's employes are doing duty on trust, with the hope of payment in the near future. It speaks well, perhaps, for the country's credit, but it is hardly satisfactory from a business standpoint.

According to the latest political intelligence that has found its way into the columns of the press, Mr. Laurier will appoint a commission on the Manitoba schools, another on the tariff, a third on preferential trade, a fourth on reciprocity with the United States, and, doubtless, numerous others on matters of minor importance.

THE GOVERNMENT RESIGNS.

Hon. Mr. Laurier Sent For.

OTTAWA, July 9. The Liberal-Conservative ministry is no more, and a messenger is on his way to Arthursville to summon Hon. Wilfrid Laurier to the capital.

There was no meeting of the Council yesterday morning for the reason that Sir Charles Tupper was at Governor-General's conference with His Excellency.

Notices for a Cabinet meeting at three o'clock were sent out, and at the appointed hour the Ministers met in the Council Chamber for the last time.

The resignation of the members of the Cabinet were first tendered to the Governor-General on Monday last, but action upon it was not taken by His Excellency until yesterday, owing to certain points which had arisen between the ministers and the Governor-General, requiring adjustment.

By four o'clock the ministers had dispersed, Sir Charles Tupper returning to the Secretary of State's Department. He remained there until 5.55 for the purpose of presenting the resignations of himself and his colleagues.

By seven o'clock it was known officially that the resignations had been accepted, and that Lord Aberdeen had sent for Mr. Laurier. The Liberal Leader will likely arrive here at noon to-day, and as his slate is practically completed the personnel of the new cabinet will be known in a day or two.

Sir Charles Tupper confirmed the news of the acceptance of his resignation. But on the matter of appointments he said he had not Lord Aberdeen's permission to say anything. Consequently his lips were sealed. What action His Excellency proposes to take, therefore, regarding appointments made by his late adviser is not definitely known yet.

There is, however, a well defined rumor that a compromise was reached, minor offices being approved by Lord Aberdeen, but relationships and judgments being left for Mr. Laurier to do. As a consequence Messrs. Angers and DeJardins will lose their seats in the Upper House, and, including the late Mr. Head's seat, there will be three places in the red chamber falling immediately to the Liberals.

NEWS NOTES.

Since Saturday cholera has made its appearance among the British troops at Wady Halfa.

It is rumored that Abbas, the young Khed ve of Egypt, will visit Europe during the present summer.

A Cairo despatch says it is reported that there are 20,000 Mahdists in Dongola, and that they are resolved upon fighting.

Some of the entombed miners in the Wilkesbarre mine are evidently still alive, as distinct tapings were heard from the interior of the mine.

From precedent to precedent the laymen are obtaining the dignity of bishops. The Presbytery of St. John has elected a lay moderator.

The C. P. R. land sales for the last six months of the year were greatly in excess of last year for the same period. There were sold since the 1st of January 12,485 acres, realizing \$81,700.

The London Standard publishes a Berlin despatch which says that the Transvaal Government has ordered 60,000 rifles from Lowe and Co., the well-known German arms manufacturers. Ten thousand of the rifles have already been delivered.

Late advices from the island of Cyprus state that a severe shock of earthquake occurred throughout the island recently, and the inhabitants of the towns of Limassol and Larina have deserted their houses and taken refuge in open fields, where they are living in tents.

At Montreal on Tuesday Rosario Bourdon, who embezzled \$50,000 from the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company and sailed to France with an opera singer, pleaded guilty and received the minimum sentence, three months in the common jail with hard labor.

Once in five years the Mayor of Newcastle, England, is rowed up the river in an Elizabethan barge, and landing at a village green, kisses his people, greets his subjects, and gives her a sovereign, to clinch Newcastle's right to the foreshore. Some of those old English customs aren't so very silly after all.

On Sunday last the British troops made an attack upon the Matabele position at Tlotha Imambane, and were repulsed. They made another attack upon the place on Monday and were successful in capturing the native stronghold and driving the defenders away. The Matabele loss was 100 killed and the British loss 23 killed or wounded.

Mr. Robert W. Hanbury, Financial Secretary of the Imperial Treasury, in the House of Commons announced that the Government had not yet arrived at a decision on the subject of Imperial aid for the East India Company, but that owing to the coming change of Government in Canada the matter would probably remain in abeyance for a short time.

The Christians in Crete are reported to have formed a provisional government. This is a somewhat desperate step, and may lead either to worse misery for the Christians of the unhappy island or to their emancipation. If the sentiment of Europe is anything like that of England, it should lead to emancipation. The cup of the Turk's iniquity, by the English measure, is about full.

A man has just died in New York because he sat in a street car up to a lady. The excessive heat and having to stand in a cramped position, are supposed to have caused heart failure, and this victim of gallantry will be a terrible warning to all those gentlemen who feel compelled to shield themselves behind their newspapers while the women hang to the strap.

Canada is now having its needs attended to for nothing. The supply of money provided for the payment of the civil service became exhausted on the 35th of

BEATEN AND DISOBEYED. This is what has happened Italy in the War With Abyssinia.

The Italian people are tardily beginning to realize that their country has emerged from the war with Abyssinia, not beaten but dishonored, but so thoroughly were the horrors of war brought home to the popular mind that it is more than doubtful if any attempt will be made to lessen the stain upon the national honor by obtaining the release of some 2,000 Italian prisoners who are still prisoners in King Mezelek's hands.

Marquis Rudini's policy of scuttling is possibly best under the circumstances, but patriotic Italians say it ought never to have been carried out until the prisoners were liberated by force or diplomacy. The latter method is now being tried, but King Humbert's envoy, Signor Nerazzini, instead of meeting King Mezelek on equal terms, will have to wade in the dust, which is the opinion of the Abyssinian warrior monarch, is the proper attitude for the representative of a nation which has been thoroughly beaten in war and has fled bag and baggage.

King Mezelek, King Harar's ally, which was to have been easily conquered and comfortably partitioned, while its ruler was to have been sent in the victor's train to Rome. Nerazzini's applications may succeed, but not until he has given to King Mezelek King Harar's vote of hand, or perhaps hard cash, for a big sum by way of ransom.

Meanwhile the prisoners are enduring frightful hardships. The latest reliable reports say that they have arrived at Antollo, after a forced march, famishing, bootless and in rags. Over 500 of these poor wretches fell dead by the roadside, victims of political exigencies in Europe.

There cannot be less than 2,000 now alive, and most of those are suffering from dysentery and other diseases due to their awful privations. The Italian government and people by way of a salute for their consciousness, have sent generous medical comforts, clothing, and money, but these cannot reach the prisoners without King Mezelek's consent, and anyhow, up to the present, they have got no further than the sea, whence it will take several weeks to transport them to Antollo, even if the necessary camels can be obtained.

Despite the semi-official denials, there is good reason to believe that the release of two months ago, but previous successes had been wasted in haggling over the price to be paid. Since then nearly a thousand prisoners have died, and for these deaths the Italian government is largely responsible.

Those who are interested in the results of the enquiry into the causes of the "blackening" of lobsters are asked to be present in the Cameron Block on Friday morning at ten o'clock.

It is stated that one of the first acts of Mr. Laurier's Administration will be to appoint Mr. Peter Mitchell, Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, in succession to the late Lieutenant-Governor Tilley. Mr. Mitchell, since his return to Montreal from his defeat in Northumbria, had had several conferences with Mr. Laurier.
