day's sessions will deal with diseases of the newborn by clinical examination, prevention and treatment of complications of measles, control of infections in the newborn nursery and poor eating. To conclude this conference a presidents' reception will be held this evening at which the guest speaker will be Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College.

Little Hazard For Majority Said Involved In Flying

The first Conjoint Scientific Assembly of the College of General Practice Chapter of the Maritimes concluded its first day of sessions at the Confederation Centre with a press conference last evening.

Dr. S.D. Clark, honorary treasurer, New Brunswick Division of the College of Practice who spoke Monday morning on "air medicine", last night told an assembly of doctors and newsmen that travelling by air carried little hazard for most people.

Dr. Clark stated that persons with heart and chest conditions present cases which have to be evaluated before flying.

"There is a very low rate of disease contracted from flying," said the doctor who added that those who are concerned about flying and who have heart conditions or other major health problems should discuss their condition with a physician. Children about a week old and women who are pregnant up to eight months are considered safe to travel by air, he stated.

One of the leading causes of death today is cancer of the lung, largely caused by cigarette smoking, said Dr. J.C. Gray, associate professor of medicine at the University of Toronto. The doctor said there is no marked change in an adult who has stopped smoking after a number of years of heavy smoking.

Dr. D.I. Rice, ex-director of the college of general practice,

stated that after a period of 10 years of not smoking a younger persons lungs will become healthy as one who has not smoked during his life.

TRIP TO RUSSIA
In elaborating on his recent trip to Russia where he observed doctors and systems different from Canada, Dr. Victor Johnston, Toronto, retiring executive director of the College of General Practice of Canada, said Russia has more than one-quarter of the doctors of the world. In heavily populated areas there is one doctor for 500 people and in other areas there is 450 persons attended by one doctor, he said.

Russia has a more effective ambulance system, he said. There are ambulances for each different cases, all accompanied by doctors.

In speaking with hospital officials in Russia, Dr. Johnston learned that institutions for sick people are constructed in such a hurry that there are not erected properly and begin to

Senator Gets Kick Out Of Campaign

OTTAWA — Political observers here are generally agreed that the election campaign to-date have been made by a Senator.

Wallace McCutcheon, the 59-year-old millionaire businessman, has been stumping the country on behalf of the Conservative party with all the enthusiasm of a youthful Commons' aspirant.

Senator McCutcheon's speeches have indicated a wide range of interest although, as a former top man in E. P. Taylor's Argus Corporation he devotes a lot of attention to the Liberal government's business and financial policies.

His active interest in politics is comparatively new as he was a surprise choice as minister of trade and commerce in the dying days of the 1962 Diefenbaker government following the walk-out of George Hees.

But friends say the Senator has taken to politics like a duck to water and gets a thrill from the roar of the crowd and the newspaper headlines. His oratorical ability is steadily improving and his deep, gruff voice lends a certain flair to the touches of humor that sprinkle his speeches.

MUCH IN DEMAND

Senator McCutcheon has been so much in demand as a speaker even before the calling of the

election, that his name has been mentioned seriously as a contender for the party leadership. But more practical people discount the chances of a wealthy Toronto Senator in having the sort of popular appeal required of a national leader.

Behind Senator McCutcheon, and contributing greatly to the quality of his speech material is his young executive assistant, Lowell Murray. Mr. Murray was on the Ottawa staff of former justice and public works minister David Fulton. He went west

Chrysler Makes Cut In Prices

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—Chrysler of Canada Ltd. Monday announced a price reduction in suggested retail prices for its 1966 model passenger cars.

Company President R. W. Toddham said the saving on the Valiant Custom 200, six-cylinder, four-door sedan will be \$22. It cost \$2,711 in 1965, and this year \$2,689 in safety equipment has been included. But the suggested 1966 price is only \$2,685.

The Dodge six-cylinder, four-door sedan will cost \$38 less. The 1966 price is \$2,945. Eighty-eight dollars in safety features have been added.

Reductions for Plymouths range from \$71 to \$112; for Chryslers up to \$133; and for the imported Imperials from \$20 to \$488.

Prices quoted do not include provincial or local taxes.

In making the announcement, Mr. Toddham said the price cuts reduce the differential between Canada and the United

States and result from the Canada-U.S. automotive trade agreement.

The agreement abolished tariffs on vehicles and auto parts shipped between the two countries.

countries, including Britain, Canada, West Germany and the United States, to request recognition.

Chikerema warned the mass uprising may even lead to the death of Negro leaders currently held in detention, but "this has to be accepted."

Chikerema said the struggle could last for days, months, or years. But it would go on "in the final analysis, it is the people who must liberate themselves. Many will die, but we must win in the end."
