BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Provincial Election imminent.

Joe Martin Likely to be in it.

OTTAWA, March 21.—A prominent British Columbian is authority for the statement that at the close of the present session of the British Columbia legislature a dissolution will take place; and it is currently reported that Premier Turner will appeal to the province with a reorganized ministry in which Mr. Joseph Martin, the ex-Manitoban, will be Attorney-general.

FLOOD THREATENED.

Montreal Would be Under Water but for the Dyke.

MONTREAL, March 21.—After immunity from floods for some twelve years, Montreal is again threatened with an inundation. In fact, were it not for the dyke the lower parts of the city would have been under several feet of water for the past twenty-four hours.

NURSERY STOCK.

Bulbs, Tubers and other Things Exempted from Prohibition

OTTAWA, March 21.—The proclamation prohibiting the importation of nursery stock from the United States exempts bulbs and tubers, conifers, certain green house and herbaceous plants, but not roses.

A DISABLED STEAMER.

Towed into Halifax Harbor.

HALIFAX, March 21.—The steamer Osborne, from London to Philadelphia was towed in here yesterday by the steamer Dunfield, also from London to Philadelphia with toll shaft broken.

THE EGYPTIAN WAR.

A Battle Near Khartoum.

KUMAR CAMP, Nubia, March 21.—A battle is imminent between the Anglo-Egyptian column and the Dervishes near Khartoum.

LONDON, March 18.—John Dillon the Irish nationalist leader, presided last evening at the nationalist banquet held at the Hotel Cecil to commemorate St. Patrick's day and the events of '98. There were seven hundred guests. Mr. Dillon read a letter from Mr. Gladstone urging the unity of Irish parties; and a telegraphic reply was sent to the venerable statesman thanking him for his "mighty championship of the Irish cause."

CALCUTTA, March 21.—Fighting on the Northwest frontier is now regarded as ended, the rebels having given the seventy hostages demanded.

SPAIN AND THE STATES.

DIFFERENT CONCLUSIONS ABOUT THE MAINE.

Both Nations Still Preparing For War

MADRID, March 18.—The following semi-official note was issued here yesterday: "The report of the Spanish commission on the Maine is not yet known, but the statement of several technical officers, who have made a close examination of the scene of the disaster, show it was indisputably due to an internal accident, American assertions to the contrary are therefore deplored in official quarters as tending to mislead public opinion and render the situation still more difficult from the standpoint of maintaining friendly relations between the two countries."

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The Spanish minister called at the state department at 3 o'clock yesterday and remained with Judge Day over an hour. Both parties to the conference were extremely reserved at its conclusion.

The semi official statement given out at Madrid advancing the government view that a demand of indemnity based on Spanish responsibility for the Maine explosion would be indignantly repelled by Spain, attracted much interest in official circles. There has been little doubt for some time that Spain was preparing for the contingency of an adverse report by the American court of enquiry, and to that end was preparing to anticipate and offset it by making clear the government policy of standing by the report of the Spanish commission. The report of the latter body was due in Madrid yesterday, and while its conclusions are not officially known, it is a foregone conclusion that it will find that the Maine disaster was due to accident, resulting in internal explosion.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The first disbursement under the recent act of congress appropriating \$50,000,000 for the national defense has been made by the treasury department on an executive order £30,000, or \$145,995, has been cable to London to the credit of Sir William Armstrong in part payment for 12 rapid-firing guns, including mounts and ammunition for the war department. The purchase price, including mounts, etc., is \$21,000 for each gun. In addition to this payment tomorrow will cable Rothschilds at London \$1,689,621 in full payment for the Brazilian cruiser Amazonas and in part payment for the Abouali.

NEW YORK, March 18.—The United States transport Kenner has sailed from this port bound for Matanzas, Cuba, with a cargo of provisions for the destitute people of Cuba. The greater part of the consignment was contributed through the Red Cross Society of Philadelphia.

COGENT ILLUSTRATIONS.

Vastness of the McKenzie Mann "scoop"

The Montreal Star offers the following illustrations of amount of territory that has been given to Messrs McKenzie and Mann by the Laurier Government. It says: People of this Province may from some idea of the magnitude of the grant by considering that the tract of territory which includes the counties of Huntingdon, Chateaugay, Napierville, St. Johns, Laprairie, Iberville, Misissquoi, Rouville, St. Hyacinthe, Vercheres, Shefford, Brome, Stanstead, Sherbrooke, Bagot, Drummond, Richmond, Richelieu, and Yamaska comprises 3,839,843 acres.

If the Province of Prince Edward Island were only three times as large as it is, it would be just about big enough to pay off McKenzie and Mann's mortgage. Unfortunately, it only contains 1,280,000 acres.

Ontario men will form a better idea by bearing in mind that the counties of Glengarry, Prescott, Stormont, Dundas, Russell, Carleton, Leeds, Grenville, Lanark and Frontenac contain 3,809,894 acres.

Irishmen throughout the world would be ablaze with indignation if the British Government proposed to give away the Province of Connaught or the Province of Leinster. Connaught, which includes the counties of Galway, Mayo, Sligo, Leitrim and Roscommon, has 4,233,239 acres; Leinster, which includes the counties of Carlow, Dublin, Kildare, Kilkenny, Kings, Longford, Louth, Meath, Queens, Westmeath, Wexford and Wicklow, comprises 4,838,261 acres.

We hardly like to hint at a comparison to Welshmen, because the McKenzie and Mann grant may turn out to be bigger than the whole of the principality. Wales contains 4,734,436 acres.

Englishmen will be glad that MacKenzie and Mann are not permitted to select their lands in the old country, because they could, and, no doubt, would gobble up the whole of the Six Home Counties, Middlesex, Sussex, Surrey, Kent, Essex and Herts, consisting of 4,086,948 acres.

"The loyalty of Scotchmen is as admirable as their business capacity, but what would happen if the British Government dared to suggest the giving away of the counties of Ayr, Linlithgow, Edinburgh Haddington, Berwick, Peebles, Selkirk Roxburgh, Dumfries, Kirkcudbright Wigtown. Yet these counties with their 3,882,249 acres, might come short of satisfying McKenzie and Mann's claim.

"In return for this princely gift, MacKenzie and Mann are to build for themselves a bit of railway about four times as long and half as good as the Montreal and Sorel."
