Local and Other Items.

MAY BEAT WIFE.—A decision was rendered by Judge Peabody in the police court at St. Louis a few days ago to the effect that under certain conditions a husband has the right to beat his wife. The case was one of Bernard Kretzer charged with beating his wife because she would not agree with him in the management of her children. Judge Peabody, in a passing judgment: In this case the wife was more guilty than the husband for trying to control and thwart her husband's will in the presence of the children, and setting them a bad example which he had a right to rebuke. There is at times when a wife irritates her husband to such an extent that he cannot control himself and uses his hand or fist. As long as no serious harm is done I believe in punishment.

STUCK BY A BLIZZARD.—Mr. B. B. Blizzard, a commercial traveller who is not unknown in Charlottetown, seems to be in considerable request just now. Blizzard represented J. J. Taylor the safe manufacturer, for some time, but is not now connected with that house. The fact that he had served his connection with that well known house was not generally known this way says a Moncton despatch, and he had no difficulty in getting a number of drafts on "the house" endorsed and cashed. It is said that Blizzard has worked parties in Amherst, Dorchester, Moncton and Campbellton. Of course the drafts came back with the explanation that Blizzard was not in the firm's employ and had no authority to draw; but Blizzard had made his exit, and his whereabouts are now unknown.

NEWS NOTES

New England cotton mills employing 130 000 to 140 000 hands, advanced wages this week practically to the rate which existed before the cut was made early last year. The mill-making the advance are said to number three-quarters of all the spindles in the north.

A curious marriage has taken place at Newcastle, England. For the third time a woman named Laskings has been before the altar in the character of a bride, and there has been something remarkable in each of her three engagements. Her first husband was a Quaker, her second a Roman Catholic and her present is a Protestant. Each husband was twice her age. At sixteen she married a man of thirty-two at thirty she took one sixty and now at forty-two she is united to a gentleman of eighty-four.

Before King Oscar of Sweden went away to the south of France, while on one of his customary walks about Stockholm, he turned down a side street and almost upset an old woman going in an opposite direction, carrying in her hand a covered dish. His majesty apologized. The woman dropped a courtesy and said, in a laughing voice "Too bad I did not fall I might have broken this old dish and received a new one from the king." "You shall have one anyway," said Oscar, and he kept his word.

Mr. Mulhall in the North American Review for April says: British capital in foreign countries has been, on the whole, a powerful agent of progress, and the effects produced by it have been in general of the most salutary kind. Like the overflow of the Nile, it has fertilized lands that would be otherwise arid and unproductive. It has opened fresh highways to commerce, and made all nations in some way tributary to England. Notwithstanding the chicanery and frauds connected with the various South American loans, the people who advanced their money were the means of doing a vast amount of benefit to that part of the world, and of creating fresh markets for British manufactures.

A Lady in Bloomers.

LONDON, April 7.—A test case which has excited great interest in cycling circles was decided at the Kingston sessions to-day, when Lady Harberton charged the janitor of a hotel with having refused to serve her because she was attired in bloomers. Lady Harberton, who is treasurer of the Rational Dress League, said on the witness stand that she had travelled for a thousand miles in bloomers, including the west end of London.

The lady's counsel contended that she only refused her ladyship in the coffee-room and would have served her in a private room or at the ordinary bar. She also claimed her business would be ruined if she was obliged to serve some women attired in bloomers. The jury decided against Lady Harberton.
