CANADIAN HAY—The London Times of Monday has a long article on the results of last season's agriculture. Speaking of the failure of the grass crop in Great Britain, it says that the scare at the prospect of the scarcity of hay with famine prices has ended. The appreciable decline in values is largely due, it declares, to the free importation of excellent hay from Canada, Ireland and the United States. Canadian timothy, says the Times, is beginning to be recognized as good for hunters and carriages horses as the best available.
