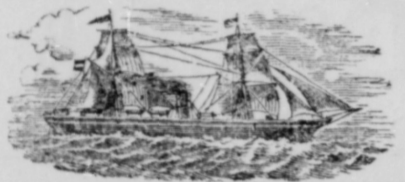

**BAD FOOD AND NEGLECT AT HOSPITAL FOR INSANE.**

The Patriot has interfered in this matter somewhat hastily and somewhat offensively, as well as unnecessarily. If the charges publicly made in THE EXAMINER were shown to be untrue the record of THE EXAMINER proves that it would readily admit the fact. If they were not untrue, then everyone will admit that THE EXAMINER was fully justified in publishing them. Whether, indeed they are true or untrue they ought to be published and there ought to be an investigation held in respect to them; for all experience has proved that it is easy to fall into careless ways in asylums for the insane whose inmates have no recourse, especially where the supplies are furnished by relatives and friends of the Government or other authorities in charge.

As a reply to The Patriot's attack upon THE EXAMINER and its correspondents we quote the report of the Grand Jury concerning the state of our public institutions, as follows:

WEDNESDAY JUNE 28th.

To THE HONORABLE THE CHIEF JUSTICE AND JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT.

We, the Grand Jury of Queen's County, having inspected the Hospital for the Insane, the Poor House, the Jail, and the Charlottetown Market House beg to report as follows:

Hospital for the Insane.—We found this building very much overcrowded, to such an extent that ten patients were compelled to sleep in rooms originally intended to accommodate five. The ceilings and floors were in some places much out of repair; particularly was this the case in male wards Nos. 1, 2, and 3. The window sashes in at least some of the halls and rooms require to be repaired.

We were much surprised to learn that ever since the building was constructed it has been customary to allow the fires to go down each night during the winter months between ten and eleven o'clock p.m., and not revived again until five or six o'clock a.m., thus exposing the inmates to an uncomfortably low temperature as well as causing the water to freeze in the pipes and on the floors. We would strongly recommend that the fires be kept up continuously during cold weather, and a uniform temperature be maintained and recorded daily in the different wards. The building throughout was as clean and tidy as its overcrowded state will permit.

We found that the flour, meal, milk and butter supplied to the institution prior to May last were in some instances totally unsuitable; but this grievance, we are assured, has been removed. We would suggest however that in future the storekeeper be required to use more caution when receiving supplies.

The Poor House appeared to be as clean and comfortable as its overcrowded and dilapidated condition permits. The Jail may be briefly described as a disgrace to the province. No provision is made for the health or cleanliness of the prisoners. Upon inquiry it was learned that the general bathroom has not been in working order for some years.

The Charlottetown Market House was also inspected, and the jury would suggest that some of the chopping blocks and table tops be renewed.

We take this opportunity of expressing our regret at the loss this province has sustained in the death of the late Judge Alley.

Thus almost every statement made by THE EXAMINER's correspondent is borne out by the Grand Inquest of Queen's County

It will not do for the government and their organs to merely denounce THE EXAMINER and the Grand Jury. Nor can they hope to be relieved from the blame attaching to them by a one-sided white-washing enquiry held at the asylum, even if a shorthand reporter were employed, and if even the editor of THE EXAMINER was not present. Neither can they shift the blame (as The Patriot tries to do) upon Mr. McPhail whose difficult position is made additionally difficult as a result of partisanship and nepotism in respect to those who furnish the asylum with food and other supplies. The responsibility rests primarily and essentially upon the government; and the people will, of course, hold the government responsible.

Concerning the failure of the editor of THE EXAMINER to respond to the invitation of Premier Farquharson, we have only to say that he was ready to go and would have gone to see and hear the evidence adduced on behalf of the Government but for a misunderstanding as to the means of transit to and from the Asylum. It is needless to say that THE EXAMINER is, at all times, amenable to fact and reason. But in the light of reason and propriety, we have to say that the action of Premier Farquharson—the man whom, above all others, the country holds responsible for the management of the hospital—in being present during the Grand Jury's enquiry, with the object influencing of its findings, is open to question and censure.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

—Settlement of the Alaskan boundary question by agreement to a modus vivendi has been further delayed.

—The Summerside Journal remarks that "the non-appointment of a County Court Judge is interfering considerably with business in Queen's County." But the business of Queen's County is a secondary consideration in the minds of ministers at Ottawa. The first consideration is to make Belfast safe for the Farquharson Administration and reconcile the French Liberals of Tignish and other constituencies to the deprivation of representations in either Senate, House of Commons or Judiciary.
