A PREPOSSESSING young girl not much over twenty, giving the name of Anna Suboiger, who stated she came a few months ago from Halifax, N. On being taken to the station it was found that she had been there before on a charge of a similar kind, but the first time it was with a revolver she had concealed on her person that she was to end her life. She died in horrible agony in Notre-Dame Hospital. MESSRS. H. H. AND W. H. THEAKSTON, two young printers from Halifax, employed at the Standard office during the last few weeks, returned home, undertaking the journey from Pictou to Halifax on foot. They left there on Wednesday at 4 p. m., and arrived at Halifax on Saturday at 7.45 p. m., and report themselves as being in fine walking trim yet. THE St. John Telegraph says that on Wednesday afternoon a serious accident occurred at Messrs. J. McGoldrick & Co's. warehouses on Portland Bridge. Two women named McNamee and Coyle, who were working in the loft assorting matter, fell through a hatchway to the floor beneath, a distance of eighteen feet, sustaining several bruises. It appears that the hatch, which runs on a tramway, is kept in its place by a pin, but had been used that a day and a bale was upon it. The women were warned to be careful and not go near it, but they proceeded to roll the bale off, and as they did so, the hatch slid over the way and they fell through. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] A Triumphant Progress. LONDON, June 18. Gladstone's journey to Edinburgh was one long continued ovation of triumph. Thanking the people at one place for their "extraordinary demonstration," he adjured them to allow nothing to distract them from the "bare question of the hour." "Attempts have been made," the venerable orator exclaimed, "and will again be made to distract attention from the real question at issue. The question is solely this: shall Ireland be trusted to manage her own affairs? Those who deny to Ireland this right, admit that Canada and other British colonies enjoy such rights. Are we to trust our fellow subjects in Ireland and govern them by love? or are we to adopt the policy of the Government's enemies and introduce into Ireland government by force?" An Independent Opinion. OTTAWA, June 18. The Evening Journal, independent, says that if the people of Nova Scotia find it a disadvantage to them to remain in the union the granting of temporary subsidies and concessions cannot make the yoke less galling, and it will be better to let them go. Let us stop all outlay upon railways, harbors, and other public works, erect custom houses at the Isthmus and treat our independent neighbors as we now treat Newfoundland. It will be better for Canada and also for Nova Scotia. St. John, N. B., will take the place of Halifax as the terminus of the Intercolonial railway, and will become the Winter Port of Canada. BRIDGEWATER, N. S., June 18. Nathaniel Wertzell, a prominent farmer who lived near here dropped dead while about to poll his vote on election day. William Hertie, a farmer, has been missing for ten days. He is said to have had a quarrel with his son and many strange rumors are afloat. Search parties are closely scouring the country in an endeavor to find him. Death in Egypt. CAIRO, June 18. An appalling mortality prevails amongst the British troops at Assouan, one hundred and six men of the Dorset Regiment alone having died within two months. Of five hundred invalids on their way to Cyprus, ten dropped dead on Sunday last. An Insinuation Repelled. OTTAWA, June 18.
