Mr. W. Gordon Foster, chairman of the P. E. I. Advisory Board to the C. N. U. B. outlined the need for the services of this organization in helping more than 160 blind men, women and children in this Province, as well as in the prevention of blindness program.

Efficiency Shown At Surprise Notre Dame Academy Fire Drill

About 10.30 on Tuesday night, the Provincial Fire Marshal, T. A. Campbell, accompanied by the City Fire Marshal, Fire Chief H. H. Jewell and Assistant Chief James Walker made a surprise call at Notre Dame Academy. Without a moment's notice to anyone they entered the building and sounded the fire alarm. These three gentlemen are high in their praise of the manner in which the Sisters handled the 130 or more occupants of this large building.

Every one of the Sisters and students were awakened from their sleep and formed up in double file, moved down the different stairways and out through the four large exits, to take up positions on the Square, at a safe distance from the building, where everyone was accounted for, including the Sisters and staff.

The remarkable part of the whole movement was the splendid order in which it was conducted,—not one word was spoken that could be heard. Each person seemed to know just what to do and where to go. Each Sister followed her company, and all doors in the building were closed on leaving each dormitory or bedroom, this being done to stop draughts and help to confine any fire to one location.

The Fire Marshal and Fire Brigade Chiefs are loud in their praise of this fine exhibition of thorough training and have expressed the wish that the parents of the students and other citizens in general could see how well the occupants of this fine institution are cared for in case of any emergency. They wish to compliment the Superior and her staff of Sisters on a wonderful job well done.

Mr. Cullen Returns From Portland Trip

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, returned from a private business trip to Portland, Maine, on Wednesday. While in Portland, Mr. Cullen inspected several fish processing plants with a view to gathering some processing and marketing ideas for use by his Department. In that respect, he said his visit was "well worthwhile."

Seven plants in Portland devote a large part of their activities to the processing and filleting of "red fish", which are brought into the port by druggers operating off the coast of Maine, and although the fillets constitute but a small part of the fish they are very tasty and are packaged in an eye-appealing cellophane wrapper, with an over-wrapper of waxed paper. "Red fish" are a deep water fish known to frequent the waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence in large quantities. Their correct name is Ocean Perch, and two plants, the Mid-Central Fish Company and F. J. O'Hara and Sons Company, make a specialty of the fillets, with almost the entire output of the Mid-Central Company being nationally distributed by the Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company.

works, we seem not to have been given fair treatment. For two elections now, we have been promised public works. We were told we were going to have a new Federal Building in Charlottetown, that we would have Naval Barracks and possibly a new Drill Hall, and that contracts were going to be let in the area for the repair of small naval vessels. One of these things have materialized.

A few weeks ago, a litter of pigs were born on my farm, and as is usually the case, there was one runt. In the crucial first days of their lives when the struggle for survival is very keen, it was easy to observe that the runt was getting pushed around badly.

Little Meat Left

"Every time I think of that runt, I think of Prince Edward Island. We are the little fellow at the far end of the Canadian table and there is little meat, for the gravy never reaches us. That condition should not be allowed to continue. The Government of this nation should be above petty provincialism and should treat all sections of the country the same.

Mr. MacLean told the Commons that a few years ago there were more people of Prince Edward Island stock in the United States than in Prince Edward Island itself. He voiced regret at the outflow of fine young people from the Province.

It was most unfortunate, he said, that the economy of the Island Province is not such that it can look after the natural increase in the population. There was the implication in his words that with Federal encouragement of industry to Prince Edward Island, this condition could be corrected.

Security Legislation

The people of his Province, Mr. MacLean said, were solidly in favour of legislation making for old age assistance and security. Moreover they felt that funds to meet the cost of such assistance could be provided from Federal government surpluses and from economies which the government could make.

Discussing rising prices, the Queen's member offered a three-point program to beat inflation and to keep commodity and other prices in reasonable limits. The program consists of: 1. Reduction of the tax burden for those in the lower income brackets. 2. Strengthen the present anti-combine legislation, and, 3. Peg prices when they have been artificially disturbed by allocation of materials for defence purposes.

He reminded the House that while newcomers to its forum lack experience in parliamentary debate, they have been in very close contact with constituents and know what the latter think of the Government and its policies. The new member also paid tribute to his predecessor in the Commons, the late J. Lester Douglas, to whom he referred as "one of nature's gentlemen."

In concluding, Mr. MacLean said: "The people I represent look upon the House of Commons as a dog in the house and they look on the Government as the tail. They are absolutely fed up with watching the tail wag the dog. In that connection, by way of reassurance to the dog and warning to the tail, my experience is that if the occasion requires it and the one is severed from the other, the dog usually survives but the tail never does."

ision could be made in Charlottetown at Great George Street, and Elm Avenue. The Province would then be divided into four parts, he stated.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, stated that to bring the matter before a distribution committee might arouse some anger about losing some of the representation the Island now has.

Mr. Cecil A. Miller, defeated candidate in the June by-election felt that if the County remains the way it is that many more Liberal candidates will go down to defeat. He stated that there had been an inference made that he secured his nomination through insidious means. "This," he said, "is a downright lie and that man is either misinformed or out to do an injury." He challenged any man in the hall to arise and say that he (Miller) had canvassed him for his nomination. "If the Liberals who were against me had left me alone and not knocked me believe the rural districts would have stood firm," he concluded.

Mr. Roland Macdonald, Southport, charged that there were too many meddlers in the last election for the Liberals good. He stated that the Liberals defeated themselves and suggested that Charlottetown should select one man and the rural areas another.

Messrs. Alan Stewart, M.L.A., and D. A. Macdonald, Glenfinnan also spoke briefly. Both men pointed out there were arguments for and against the division.

Leadership Resolution

In the resolution regarding the selection of a party leader, the meeting expressed itself as being "in entire accord" with a resolution carried at the annual meeting of Nov. 29, 1949, which read as follows: "Whereas the method of selecting a leader for the Liberal Party in Canada and in all of the Provinces, with the exception only of Prince Edward Island, is by majority vote of the accredited delegates at a properly constituted Dominion or Provincial Convention called for this purpose."

"Therefore be it resolved: that when in the future (and we hope the very distant future) it becomes necessary to choose a successor to our present esteemed leader in this province, the new leader shall be elected at a General Convention of the Prince Edward Island Liberal Association, if, at that time, this Association has been authorized and organized, if not, at a General Convention called by the four Liberal Associations, namely: The East Prince Liberal Association, The

(Up 4,040 cwt., and \$12,804); flounders, 491 cwt., \$1,469. (Up 301 cwt., and \$1,270); mackerel, 12,367 cwt., \$26,385. (Up 1,091 cwt., and \$2,635); herring, 62,547 cwt., \$66,723. (Up 4,409 cwt., and \$2,985); smelts, 4,016 cwt., \$39,198. (Down 194 cwt., and \$5,869); lobster, 82,791 cwt., \$1,686,479. (Down 7,223 cwt., and \$229,898); clams, 4,326 cwt., \$5,468.
