LOCAL BRIEFS

P.E.I. Milk Association Asks For Price Increase

A decision to ask for a price of \$5.25 per hundredweight, basis 3.6 per cent milk was taken at a meeting here Thursday night of the Producer Section, P.E.I. Fluid Milk Association. It was held in Birch-Court, Experimental Farm, President Wallace Mallett, Union Road presided. The current price is \$4.62 per hundredweight, basis 3.6 per cent butterfat. It was explained by producers spokesmen that the Nova Scotia milk producers who supply the Halifax milk market, for example, receive \$6.10 per hundredweight for milk testing 3.7 per cent butterfat, which is one-tenth of a point higher butterfat content. The suggestion for an increased price for this "fluid milk", as it is called, has been set in motion by the increased federal government subsidy which has the effect of guaranteeing \$4.00 per hundredweight for milk going into the manufacture of butter, for example. That price is for milk delivered at dairy plants. (See story by E.W. Adams, provincial dairy superintendent, elsewhere in this issue.)

The fluid milk producers, those who supply plants supplying urban areas with bottled milk, consider they are under more expense as they have to guarantee a certain "standard", or guaranteed quantity of milk every day of the year.

In addition there is the problem of a lower price for "surplus" milk which lowers the return considerably. Also expressed at the Thursday night meeting was a desire for more uniformity of fluid milk prices across the province than there is at the present time.

It has been suggested on several occasions by dairy spokesmen that the probable increase in price of bottled milk might run to two cents per bottle. However the milk control board is the organization that will decide on what the increase will be, and on what the producers will receive for their milk. This board is under the chairmanship of Judge W.E. Darby of Summerside. Both consumers and producers of the province are represented on the board.

AWARDED CONTRACTS
Canada Packers Ltd., of Charlottetown has been awarded two contracts by the Department of Defence Production, it was announced in Ottawa by industry minister C. M. Drury. Both contracts are for the supply of meat and are valued at \$41,478 and \$16,497. They are among 72 unclassified defence contracts totalling over \$2 million awarded by the department.

Federal Dairy Policy Outlined

(Ed. Note — The following is a simplification of the provisions of the new federal dairy policy. It has been prepared by E.W. Adams, Provincial Dairy Superintendent.)

During the past year the returns that cream shippers have received from the plant for their product have been based on a support level of 64 cents for creamery butter. However, the Agricultural Stabilization Board's selling price for butter has been on the basis of either 55 cents or 57 cents per pound. Therefore, the returns received by cream shippers per pound of butter, 10.9 cents has come from the Federal Treasury. The procedure has been that the dairy plant has made this payment to shippers and has then claimed reimbursement from the Agricultural Stabilization Board.

SUPPORT INCREASED
Under the support program starting April 1, 1966 the support level has been increased and the method of payment changed. Starting April 1, the payment that cream shippers will receive from the creamery

will be based on a selling price for creamery butter at 59 cents. This will permit the creameries to pay their cream shippers somewhere between 61 and 63 cents per pound butterfat. Instead of receiving a subsidy of 10.9 cents per pound butterfat, cream shippers will receive a direct payment of 21.43 cents per pound of butterfat from Ottawa. This payment will be made once every three months. When the final returns are received cream shippers will receive in the vicinity of 83 — 85 cents per pound of butterfat for all farm separated cream.

Cream shippers will not be required to make a claim for the 21.4 cents subsidy as the dairy plants will submit a record of receipts to the Agricultural Stabilization Board. **\$3.65 AT FARM**
Under the new dairy policy manufacturing milk producers should receive on the average \$4.00 per hundred weight F.O.B. plant for Grade A milk based on a 3.5 per cent butterfat test or approximately \$3.65 F.O.B. farm. This will be accomplished by the plant paying milk producers on the average \$2.90 per hundred weight F.O.B. farm. A direct payment of 75 cents per hundred weight will be paid to manufacturing milk producers once a month from Ottawa.

Fluid milk producers will be able to participate in the plan. They will receive the direct payment on all milk in excess of 120 percent of the milk on which they obtain fluid prices. In other words, if they sell 1,000 pounds at fluid prices, they will receive the payment on all milk in excess of 1,200 pounds. In order to implement the increased level of assistance outlined above it is essential that all dairy producers become registered as soon as possible. If you HAVE NOT already done so, it is in your interest to obtain a registration form from your dairy plant, complete and return it to your plant as soon as possible.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says clouds associated with a disturbance east of Maine had spread into the southwestern sections of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick late Friday evening. Fog was reported along the Nova Scotia coastline. Elsewhere only patchy clouds were reported.

Three Island students are enrolled in the advanced navigation course at the Navigation School in the Provincial Vocational Institute and all three are studying for positions as marine officers. The students are: John Beaton, Charlottetown; Delbert Raynor, New Annan and Leslie McNevin, Argyle Shore.

Mr. Beaton, recently employed as Quartermaster aboard CCGS "Wolfe", is shortly to take his examination in Chartwork and Pilotage for the Second Mate Certificate of Competency. Mr. McNevin has been successful in all three written and Chartwork and Pilotage examinations, and will be examining this month in Orals and Signalling. This will be his final appearance before the Supervising Examiner of Masters and Mates, Captain H. D. Mackay, Halifax, and if successful will be awarded his Second Mate's Certificate. He is presently employed with the Federal Department of Fisheries aboard one of their Patrol Boats. Mr. Raynor is in possession of a Temporary Master's Certificate and is

studying the Canada Department of Transport syllabus for Master of a power driven vessel of less than 350 tons gross.

"Due to the increased content of Marine Certificate syllabus with the subsequent upgrading of the marine officer's professional knowledge, it is normal procedure for a potential officer to spread his studies and examinations over the maximum period of 30 months allowed.

Captain John Palmer, in charge of the Navigation Department for the past three years, is a graduate of the School of Navigation, University of Southampton, and has recently become actively involved in fisheries training.

Mr. W.S. McMurtry, Provincial Director of Vocational Training, is making every effort to see that courses for both advanced marine qualification and the upgrading of navigational and technical skills of the fishermen will continue to meet present and future requirements and be supplied with the most modern equipment available.

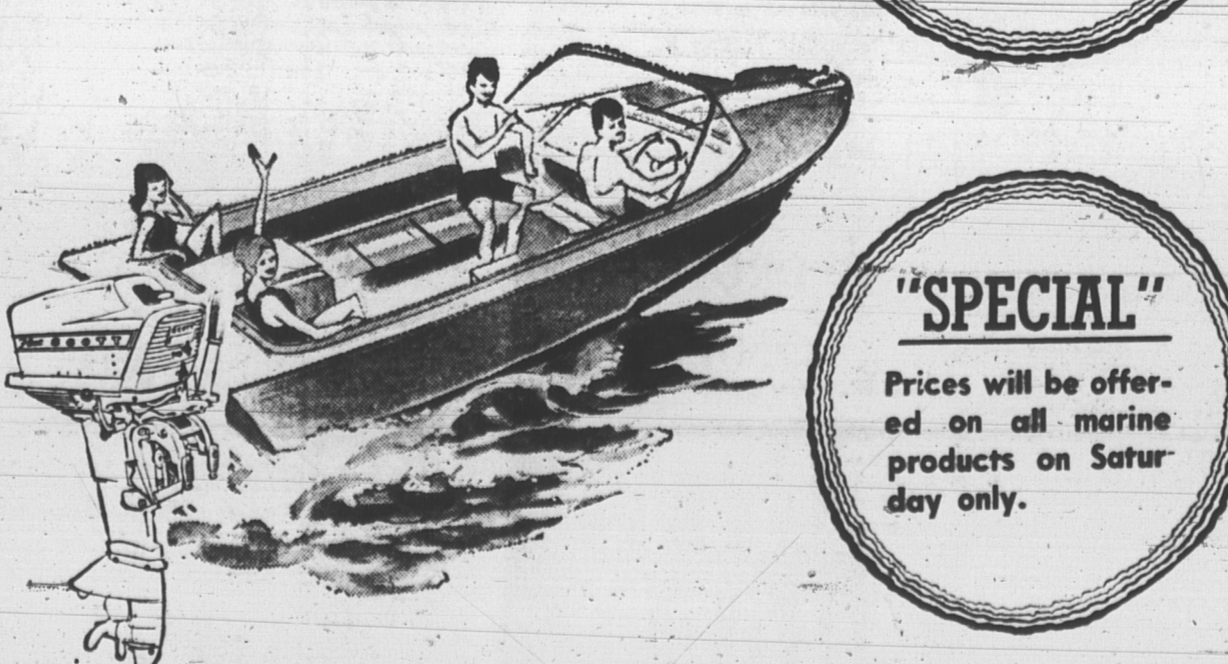
