Word has been received of the death of Mrs. Mary E. (Young) Briggs of Attleboro, Mass., who passed away on November 13 in her 82nd year. The deceased was born in Albion, P. E. I., but had lived in Attleboro for the past 60 years, except for thirteen years when she lived in Touisset.

She was married to William A. Briggs on June 22, 1899 at the home of her brother, Daniel Young. Her husband died in December 1954. Mrs. Briggs was the daughter of the late John Young and Mrs. Catherine (Reynolds) Young. From 1911 to 1937 she and her husband came to Canada and she began a grocery store, and she became known to all the residents of the area. She was a member of Centenary Methodist Church.

A daughter, Mrs. Pearl (Raymond W.) Fales, survives, as do two brothers, Leith Young and Albert Young, and two sisters, Mrs. Annie Hopwood and Miss L. Blanche Young of North Attleboro. She also leaves several nieces, nephews, grand nieces and grand nephews.

The funeral service was held at the John W. Money Funeral Home, the Rev. Percy M. Spurrer, pastor of Centenary Methodist Church, officiating. 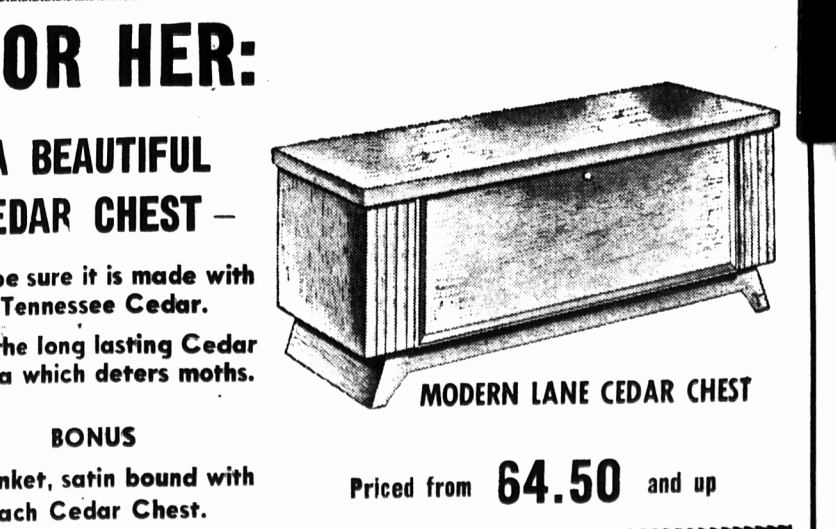
