

Jobless Fund Ends March With Something Left In Kitty

By ROBERT RICE OTTAWA (CP)—The unemployment insurance fund weathered March and entered April with several million dollars in the kitty to meet benefit payments, reliable sources here.

This means the fund did not use the \$25,000 emergency loan provided by the last Parliament for emergency use if the fund went dry during the 1962 fiscal year that ended Sunday.

It also means that government warrants will be used to keep the fund going into the summer upturn in employment starts to bring in more money in contributions than it paid out in benefits.

Sources indicated that the warrant program in the Santa emergency funds for April has been approved and will be made public in Saturday's official Canada Gazette.

The warrant is reported to involve less than \$25,000 and will be good only for April. It will be a maximum amount from the emergency use of the Insurance Commission will be able to draw funds to meet its benefit payments.

NO PREDICTIONS Official declines to predict just when the fund—which held more than \$900,000,000 in 1959—will run dry.

But some time in the next few days, the fund will be operating on money borrowed from the federal treasury—money that will have to be paid back at current rates of interest.

The fund entered 1963 with about \$800,000,000. In January, it dropped to \$71,800,000. February's heavy drama pushed it down to \$57,800,000. The March balance will not be made public until later this month, but is understood that the fund has dropped by about \$25,000,000, leaving something like \$40,000,000 at the end of the month.

The demand for benefit payments in April generally falls off—as good weather brightens the mood.

Declarer cashed four diamond tricks and West was able to have three cards—the K of hearts and ace of spades. Spade suit is a situation correctly when he led the seven of spades to force the ace (this three cards at this point were the K-7 of spades and queen of hearts), but it did him no good.

West took the ace, and, having by this time learned South's distribution, returned the king of hearts. This pinned the ace and queen together and, as a result, West scored his Jack of hearts to defeat the contract three tricks. The opening lead a club instead of a spade—made a difference of four tricks in the play.

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Cuba Expresses Regret In Raid On U.S. Freighter

WASHINGTON (AP)—Cuba has expressed regrets for what it said was an ill-considered attack on a U.S. freighter last Thursday. It promised to try to prevent such incidents in the future.

At the same time Cuba asked the United States to consider the seriousness of the situation in the Caribbean and to stop hijacking raids on Cuba.

This was reported by Czech Ambassador Miloslav Ruzek, who handed the state department the Castro regime's reply to the U.S. demand for a "full explanation" of the March 29 incident.

There was no immediate comment from the state department. The U.S. had demanded the explanation after reporting that Russian-built planes, apparently Cuban, had fired in the general direction of the U.S. freighter Floridian, bound from Puerto Rico to Miami, Fla. The ship was not hit.

Ruzek said the Havana regime reported its MIGs were in pursuit of another unidentified vessel when they came across the Floridian, which was some 25 miles off the northern coast of Cuba.

The pursuing Cuban planes "overtook the vessel" (the Floridian) and before identifying they fired some warning shots across the bow," Ruzek quoted the Cuban note as saying.

"The Cuban government regrets the incident and expresses a willingness to take measures to prevent a repetition of such incidents," the Czech envoy reported.

"The Cuban government also notes the seriousness of the situation and requests a stop to this kind of thing (hit-and-run raids) lest the situation get out of hand."

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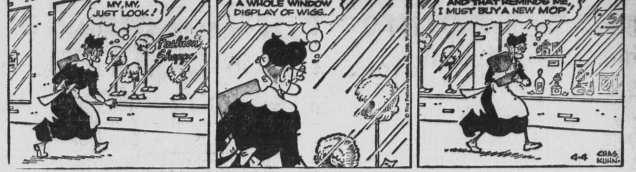

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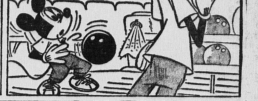
