PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

WEDNESDAY, April 4. After recess, Hon. Mr. Gordon continued his remarks re the Registry Office resolution. He took strong ground against the proposed increase in the fees charged, and quoted from a speech made by Hon. Mr. Peters in 1891 wherein it was stated that the establishment of a Registry Office at Summerside would not entail any additional expenditure. Mr. Gordon also quoted the hon. member from Bedouque as speaking in a similar strain. Mr. Bell followed, speaking in support of the resolution. He pointed to the advantages the Registry Office conferred upon the people, and said he agreed with the proposition that the office should be made self-sustaining. The cost to the public should be made as light as possible, however, and if there are more men employed than are necessary they should be discharged. If the officials were required by law to work from 9.30 a.m. to 5 p.m., it would enable the Government to discharge one or two of the present staff of employees. There was, however, another mode by which the burden of the office could be lightened. He referred to the other classes of inclosure, under the Conservative Government, he had introduced a measure to shorten the forms and lessen the Registry fees. The proposition failed at that time, but it was his intention to reintroduce the measure this season, and he trusted the measure would pass. Mr. Shaw spoke against the proposed change, arguing that if the fees in the Registry Office were raised, the charge would be against the best interests of the poor people of the Province. He quoted the present leader of the Government as offering to name the Registry Office for \$1,000 a year less than it cost the preceding administration, and asked how it was that he now came forward to increase the burden of the people by putting up the fees. Referring to the statement of Hon. Mr. Peters that the Registry Office was largely self-sustaining he quoted the public accounts to show that in 1887 the receipts over expenditure amounted to \$196,146; in 1888 to \$716,214; in 1889 to \$1,557,344; in 1890 to \$716,444; in 1891 to \$628,344; in 1892 to \$172,890. "Owing to the delay of the Premier in tabling the public accounts for 1893," said he, "there is no knowing what the revenue or expenditure was for that year." He then went on to criticise the manner in which some persons were pitched into clerkships in the Registry Office at high salaries. The Registrar, said he, is a good man, but there are officials in the office who are mere figureheads, whose services might be disposed of without working any injury to the country. The resolution was then put and carried on division, the Government supporting it in a body and the Opposition voting against it. The House then went into committee, with Mr. Warburton in the chair, and the resolution was reported agreed to without amendment. Hon. Mr. Peters then introduced a bill relating to the registration of deeds, etc., which was read a first time and made the order of the day for a second reading to-morrow. Mr. Peters then moved the House into committee of the whole for the purpose of considering the following resolution, namely: "That it is desirable to introduce a Bill to amend the Law with regard to the fees to be charged by the Prothonotary of the Supreme Court so that hereafter the sum of sixty cents and no more shall be charged for the filing and entering of every chattel mortgage or Bill of Sale, and that for every search in the said Office shall be charged the sum of twenty-five cents." He explained that the fees now charged were altogether too small, and claimed that they had an undoubted right to raise a revenue out of that office and out of the Registry office too for that matter. The resolution carried, and was committed and reported agreed to without amendment. The bill incorporating the Murray Harbor South Quarrying Company was also made the order of the day for a second reading to-morrow. House adjourned till 10 o'clock on Thursday.
