

Dutchmen Win Allan Cup And Senior Hockey Title

KITCHENER, Ont., (CP)—Kitchener-Waterloo won its first Allan Cup in 35 years Wednesday night as the Dutchmen blanked Penitton V's 5-0 in the fifth game of the best-of-seven series for the Canadian senior hockey championship.

Goalie Bob Gillson, the substitute netminder from Owen Sound, Ont., who came in last Saturday to play sensational hockey, and hand the Dutchmen their only defeat, went down with flying colors.

He made 48 stops against a high-flying club that just would not be denied. The V's tried hard but they were outskated and outplayed all the way.

It was a storied wind-up to a season that saw the Dutchmen come from third place in their Ontario Hockey Association Senior A series to sweep aside the Red Indians in five games, Owen Sound Mercury in six, and Sudbury Wolves and Smiths Falls

Rookie Pitcher Hurls No-Hitter For St. Louis

For the second time in the history of baseball, a pitcher has hauled a no-hitter in his first major-league start.

Alva (Bob) Holloman, a graduate from Syracuse Chiefs of the International League who had only two previous relief appearances on his American League record, turned the trick Wednesday as St. Louis Browns blanked Philadelphia Athletics 6-0.

Holloman faced only 31 men, walking five and allowing a sixth to reach first base on his own error. The 27-year-old right-hander had two men on base on walks when he got the final out.

His achievement was the first no-hitter by a first-time starter since Charlie Jones did it for Cincinnati in 1892.

Holloman's brilliant performance stole the pitching spotlight from a Brownie pitching hero of two years ago, Ned Garver, who showed signs of a comeback after a sore-arm season with Detroit Tigers.

Garver, a 26-game winner with the last-place Browns of 1951, scattered 10 hits to lead the lowly Tigers to an 8-4 victory over Washington Senators.

Garver Leads Tigers To 8-4 Win Over Senators

Two years ago, Ned Garver was one of baseball's heroes when he won 20 games for the last-place St. Louis Browns.

Last year Detroit Tigers acquired him from the Browns. But the only similarity between his 1951 and 1952 seasons was that he was still working for a last-place club.

That still holds good in the early stages of 1953. But the arm trouble that plagued Ned last season appears to be cured, judging by his performance Wednesday, when he scattered 10 hits to lead the lowly Tigers to an 8-4 victory over Washington Senators.

Despite an injured knee, which buckled on him once during the game, Garver blanked the Nats in every inning except the fifth, in which Clyde Vollmer's homer with two on contributed to a four-run Washington outburst.

Garver, always a dangerous hitter, helped his cause with a two-run homer in the eighth inning.

In other American League action, lefty Billy Pierce pitched a six-hitter as Chicago White Sox ended a three-game losing streak by beating Boston Red Sox 6-2.

New York Giants climbed into sixth place in the National League, pounding out 15 hits as they defeated Chicago Cubs 8-5.

The Cubs blew a 3-0 lead to absorb their seventh straight loss. Al Corwin, who relieved starter Sal Maglie, gained credit for the victory.
