Riverside Course Will Test Stars

With the Canadian Open golf championship being played at the Riverside Golf Club, Saint John, N. B., on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 17, 18 and 19, Percy W. Thomson looms in the forefront of news emanating from the scene of the title 72-hole tournament.

The course, over which "Slammin'" Sam Sneed, largest money winner among the United States professionals last year, is expected to defend his coveted crown and the Seagram gold cup, emblematic of the championship, has, ever since 1894, become the personal hobby of Mr. Thomson, who has spent a small fortune out of his own pocket in a successful effort to make the Riverside course one of the finest playing tests in the Dominion, or on this continent for that matter.

Mr. Thomson first started trying to improve the Riverside course because he wanted something to do outdoors. The work has been carried out. Another thing that got him interested in the improvement of the course at Saint John was that he was fed up with playing on poor courses, and that work seemed to help better conditions and was very interesting.

Leading professionals from Eastern Canada clubs have played the course and each one of them holds quite a respect for the toughness of its layout. Sound holes make for sound play, but put a crimp into sensational scoring the like of which has been witnessed previously every time the United States niblick wielders have stepped up to the tees in championship play this year. Riverside is expected to head them all by with the aid of Old Man Par and low scores in the 80's are not expected to be posted in the Canadian Open next month to such an extent that the course will be literally "burned up."

Riverside is fully expected to hold its own with the golfing greats of this continent because of the thoroughness with which Mr. Thomson has attended to his work.

Ontario Golf Team Posts Record Aggregate Score To Retain Willingdon Trophy

ST. BRUNO, Que., July 24—Getting warmer as the day grew cooler, Ontario's team of four retained the Willingdon Cup inter-provincial team golf championship today with a record aggregate of 583 for 33 holes over Mount Bruno's sun-baked course.

British Columbia came from fourth place at the end of 18 holes to take second in the final tabulation with 586 strokes, Quebec was third with 601 and the others followed in this order: Alberta, 605; Manitoba, 613; Saskatchewan, 628; Nova Scotia, 647 and Prince Edward Island-New Brunswick, 674.

Rolling home with a sizzling 33, two under par, Phil Farley of Toronto set the pace as Ontario widened its three-stroke lead over Quebec at the half-way mark to the record shattering ten on British Columbia at the finish. Farley finished with a one-under-par 69, the only man to shatter even figures.

But Farley had grand support from Ross (Sandy) Grosverville of London, Ont., who tied two par 70's—An Ontario amateur champion, who recovered from a morning 76 for a 70 in the afternoon. Only Jack Nash of London failed to equal this pace, Sandy's club-mate carding 77-79—156.

The Ontario total eclipsed the record 596 set by British Columbia on Laval-Sur-Le-Lac, Montreal, in 1933.

Troubled by the sandy fairways and fast greens... Maritimes golfers couldn't do much about the cup competition. Pete Kelly, the red-haired New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island champion, had 80-77—157 and Maurice Dowling of Charlottetown was next lowest on the combined team with 88-78—166.

While the team men and juniors fought for their titles, 26 amateurs started off the Canadian amateur championship with a preliminary round. The champion proper will get under way tomorrow morning.
