

Islanders Eke Out 5-4 Victory Over Halifax

Moncton Hawks Break Jinx, Score 4-1 Victory Over Beavers Saturday

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 29 — (CP) — Moncton Hawks broke the jinx which had been hanging over them for eight games when they defeated Saint John Beavers 4-1 in a Maritime Senior Hockey League game here Saturday.

Injections of power in the offensive and defensive departments spelled the difference between victory and defeat for the Gordie Drillon-coached Monctonians. Being a new line of Murray Richardson, recently acquired from Charlottetown Islanders, and Frank Imonti and Win Mousseau, Hawks outskated and outscored the Beavers in a close-checking game which saw 11 penalties handed out, most of them for roughing and high sticking.

Fighter play on the defence highlighted the Hawks win. Beavers were checked closely all the way and Freddie Sonier, subbing for Les Colvin in the Moncton cage, was given almost airtight support by his mates.

The Richardson, Imonti, Mousseau line sparked the Hawks attack. Coach Drillon used the trio to spike Beavers power line of Whitlock and Nicolle. They held the high scoring duo in check and accounted for two of Moncton's goals.

Lusty body work by Mousseau and big Charlie Phillips slowed the Beaver attack.

Beavers were handicapped by the absence of Manny McIntyre, from left wing on the line with Whitlock and Nicolle, who is out with a leg injury. They iced 13 players to Hawks 15.

Galipeau opened the scoring at the seven minute mark on a neat passing play with Demchuk. Both teams were short-handed at the time, Hawks being short two men and Beavers one.

Win Mousseau fired Hawks second tally on a neat passing attack with linemates Richardson and Imonti.

Jodoin put Beavers back in the running at 1:41 of the second period on a long shot from the blue line. Nicolle was credited with an assist.

Beavers were short two men when Charlie Phillips netted Hawks third tally. He rifled a bullet drive past Brodeur after receiving a relayed pass from Denny and Galipeau.

Imonti picked up his second point with seven seconds of play remaining. Demchuk and Mousseau drew assists on a breakaway play which caught Beavers pressing deep in Hawks territory.

Murph Chamberlain and his Islanders have done it again. For the ninth consecutive time this season they have skated off the ice victorious in Maritime Senior Hockey League scheduled competition. Their ninth and latest victory was at Halifax on Saturday night and was their fourth win over Saint Mary's, last year's Big Four champions.

But the competition is getting keener and closer at every meeting, and the Islanders really had to turn it on there Saturday night to pull it off the fire. Considerably strengthened with new players and in definitely better condition, the Marty Barrie-coached crew made it a bitter battle right to the closing whistle—the Islanders skating off with a slim 5-4 victory.

Looking back over the previous game scores between these two clubs the reason for saying that the competition is closer and keener is quite evident. In the first two games Charlottetown won by scores of 6-3, 6-2, but in the third it was 5-3, one goal less for the winners and one goal more for the opposition. And as mentioned above, the Saturday night clash was by the narrowest it could be—one goal.

And for the most part fans across the three Provinces are glad to see it that way, it makes for better competition, and as far as local fandom is concerned they are just as pleased to see their favourite Islanders win by one goal as three or four. In fact they would prefer it that way. That is when a fan gets the real thrill of the game—when their team comes through the hard way. Even coach Chamberlain himself stated Saturday night that "the strong clubs should do everything they can to strengthen the weaker ones in the interests of making it a better league."

What is more that is not just idle talk on Chamberlain's part. He proved his sincerity in that respect last week when he sent Murry "Muzz" Richardson to Moncton Hawks. Richardson is a husky six-foot-one-inch centreman who played the first seven games with the Islanders this season and made a highly impressive showing in all those games. He picked up five scoring points during that time with a goal and four assists, and his worth to the Moncton squad was in evidence against Saint John on Saturday night. Playing his first game under coach Gordon Drillon, Murray set up one of the four goals that paced the Hawks to their first victory this season. He entered for Hawk number one line of Frank Imonti and Win Mousseau.

Speaking of Hawk's Saturday night win, that is something else fans will be pleased to hear. Drugging in the cellar all season so far, the Moncton squad overcame an eight-game losing slump to garner their first decision in nine starts at the expense of the second place Saint John Beavers, who share that spot with Halifax. It was a good margin win for the Drillon crew 4-1—and speaks well for the future hopes of the Club.

But if they plan to stretch their wins to two straight, they will have to do something that no other team in the league has done this season—beat the Charlottetown Islanders. The two squads will meet here tonight at the Forum, and despite the fact that the Islanders have proven themselves the toughest team in the league to date, they are going to be even tougher tonight when they come out determined to send their undefeated record to ten full games.

That work "record" incidentally, brings up another line of thought. If the locals do what fans here hope they will do tonight, it will be about time for the custodians of "Big Four" records to start thumbing pages. If nine or ten straight wins is not a new record in the annals of the league, then it must be getting mighty close. How about it Mr. Recorder?

Red Wings Shut Out Boston Bruins 2-0; Other Sunday Night Games Tied

DETROIT, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Young Terry Sawchuk of Detroit Red Wings hung up his shut-out of the National Hockey League season as he blanked the hapless Boston Bruins 2-0 before a small turnout of 10,093 fans tonight.

It left the Bruins still looking for a victory after their first seven starts in the N.H.L. campaign. They have lost four and tied three. Tonight's game was settled in the first 12 minutes of play as the third-place Detroiters slipped a pair of goals past Jack Gelineau to complete their scoring. From then on Detroit spent most of its time worrying Gelineau, who had 33 saves while Sawchuk had 25.

The action was dull partly due to mushy ice. The rink was in the same condition Saturday night when Detroit beat Chicago 3-1, the poor ice being due to fog and humidity.

Midway in the final period a full-scale brawl broke out, with Boston's Perry Flaman tangling with Steve Black and Leo Reise successively. The Flaman-Reise bout was the best seen in Olympia in some time and made some of the recent boxing cards look sad by comparison.

Both drew five-minute major penalties for the fistfights with Black and Ed Sandford of Boston escaping with minor penalties.

HALIFAX, Oct. 29 — (CP) — Charlottetown Islanders extended their winning streak to nine games here Saturday, defeating Halifax St. Mary's 5-4 in a Maritime Senior Hockey League game watched by 7,000 fans who packed the Forum.

The game produced 18 penalties, including three majors and four misconducts, and two fights. Three new imports with St. Mary's played well, with the netminding of Eddie D'Aoust bringing the overflow crowd to its feet several times. Newcomer Eddie Brown hit Islanders hard and often and winger Hardy Black worked hard up front and got one Halifax goal.

Feelings ran high from the start, and a few minutes after the game got underway St. Mary's Red Conrad broke his stick over Islanders' George McLagan's head. Later in the first period Peanuu McLaughlin and Pawlynszyn of Charlottetown tangled to earn majors, and D'Aoust and Dowling began to swing sticks. Dowling was penalized for slashing the goalie.

For the third time in the four games the two teams have played, Halifax took the lead and failed to hold it. Islanders went on a scoring spree in the second period to net four goals. Danny Horeck scored when D'Aoust came out of his net to smother a rebound and missed. Frank Bathgate whipped McLagan's rebound home five minutes later. Walter Pawlynszyn scored when a Halifax player cleared to him in front of his own net and Gray got the fourth when his pass-out hit a Halifax player and went behind D'Aoust.
