Rangers Dump Tightened Race

National Hockey League teams this season are remarkably alike when it comes to losing—none like it but outside of Montreal. Canadiens' check has lost almost exactly the same number of times.

The high-flying Habitués have only five losses in 26 games and are leading the race by a nine-point lead over runner-up New York Rangers.

But New York, Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs all have lost 12 times and Detroit Red Wings and Chicago Black Hawks 13.

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Doug Mohs Unable to Talk As Yet After Hockey Fight

MONTREAL (CP) — President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said Friday he hasn't yet disposed of the case of defenceman Ian Cushman of Chicago Black Hawks largely because one of the principal witnesses hasn't been able to talk.

Until a few years ago match penalties and game misconduct penalties were reviewed by the league president but there is no automatic suspension. Until Campbell disposes of the affair, Cushman can continue to play. He will be with his club against Toronto Leafs in two days.

Campbell said he may be able to dispose of the case without a formal appearance of Mohs at an oral hearing and will talk with Boston officials. The Bruins play the Leafs tonight.

There was a similar situation in the Cal Gardner case five years ago. Gardner, then with Toronto, suffered a broken jaw in a game Dec. 1, 1950, when he and Ken Reardon of Montreal Canadiana were at each other with sticks. It was two weeks before Campbell could complete hearings and Reardon was suspended for one game. Gardner was held in hospital and fined \$200.
