Possibility New Sputnik Has Broken In 2 Sections

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russia's newest satellite viewed by thousands in a pre-drawn sweep across North American skies, may have split in two.

Scientists at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge, Mass., said it is the most possible the elongated, 1.18 pound space vehicle has failed to come apart.

They were studying reports from observers in Chicago and Toronto that the main section of Sputnik II appeared to be trailing a second object. Radio signals on the satellite's 20 megacycle band indicated they might be coming from two separate objects.

Observers reported their belief that the satellite might try for some spectacular Thursday in the 40th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution.

The two favorite pieces of speculation were:

What an attempt might be made to eject from the satellite a container carrying Laika, the space dog.

That the Russians might take shot at the moon.

Sputnik II was estimated to have been only about 130 miles high on its flights over the United States Thursday. Rising and falling in brilliance, its color was variously described as bluish white, pinkish, ruddy and

even red.

Dr. Fred L. Whipple, director of the Cambridge observatory, while saying that Sputnik II may have come apart, could not confirm it positively yet.

Andrew B. Ledwith, the observatory's radio technician, reported the satellite's radio tone on the 20 megacycle band seemed to be more prolonged, suggesting coming from two transmitters.

that a new type of power was developed to get their satellites into space, it was disclosed in Washington that U.S. military scientists are pressing broad research in a quest for new or improved rocket fuels.

The Chicago Tribune and the New York Daily News said Thursday that Eisenhower is considering a plan to launch a space ship bigger than Sputnik II by using giant military rockets.

The Tribune's story said the ship would carry live animals and establish its orbit at an average height of 600 miles.

There was no official confirmation of the reports in Washington. The first full fledged U.S. satellite is scheduled to go up sometime next March.

Nurses Told Pay Is Higher Under Health Insurance

OTTAWA (CP)—The proposed national hospital insurance scheme may mean faster pay cheques for Canadian nurses.

Officials at the first Canadian conference on nursing which ended a two-day session here Tuesday told a press conference that nurses salaries now are higher in provinces such as British Columbia which has its own hospital insurance scheme.

Margaret Keir of Montreal, editor of the Canadian Nurse, a professional publication of the Canadian Nurses Association, said the basic monthly salary for a general staff nurse in B.C. is \$275.

In comparison, basic salaries in New Brunswick where no provincial scheme exists are around \$200, Miss Keir said.

Conference officials told the press conference to "draw your own conclusions on the effects of a national scheme on nursing salaries." Hospital administrator R.H. Stocker of Fredericton, N.B., added that patients fees indirectly paid for hospital costs of nursing services.

EDUCATION ISSUE
A strong plea to close schools of nursing in or associated with hospitals was entered by Dr. Leonard Miller of St. John's, Nfld., Newfoundland's deputy health minister.

He urged the conference to "improve what we have rather than replacing it with something we don't know much about."

He was opposed to taking nurse education out of hospitals where it had been successful and placing it in a university or a central training school, "or something equally damaging."

Dr. Miller supported a recommendation—defeated by the conference—which expressed the belief that nursing education was likely to remain in or associated
