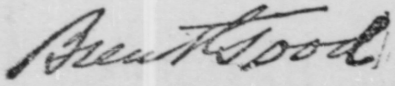

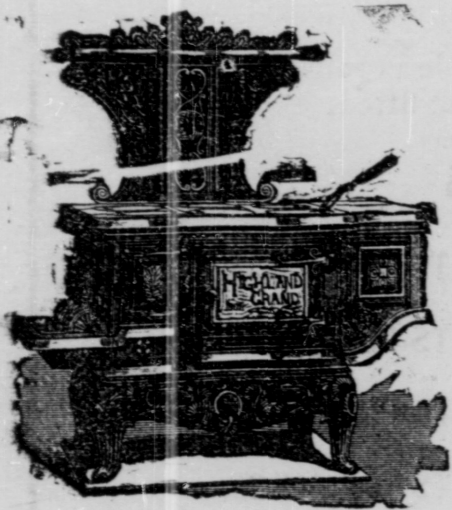

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

WHERE is our natural market, now, Sir Louis?

THE empty coal scuttle will be more conspicuous than the full dinner pail in many a home this fall.

AS Honest John Charlton says, it is absurd to contend that the prosperity of the country is in any sense due to the present Government.

THE full dinner pail argument emanated from an empty head. Canada has a head and a heart as well as a stomach to appeal to.

SIR Louis Davies assured the electors of North River that they "don't pay much more than half as much taxes now when the goods are imported from Great Britain." He also assured the electors that he never told a lie.

SIR Louis Davies said, on Saturday evening that tenders for the purchase of the Government stock of binder twine were advertised in every paper in Canada. We do not remember to have seen that advertisement—do you?

SPEAKING at North River of the increase of Canadian exports to Great Britain, Sir Louis Davies exclaimed, "We've done it." But who did it for the States which has a much larger increase of exports to Great Britain than has Canada?

SIR LOUIS DAVIES still seems to think that when duties are imposed prices must necessarily rise and that when duties are taken off prices will fall. But the experience of the people of Canada in the past twenty-two years proves that this is not always true.

SIR Louis claims great credit for the higher prices obtained for cheese and butter; but he repudiates all responsibility for the lower prices received for oats and potatoes, as well as for the higher prices paid for store goods. "The Government can't govern prices, don't you see."

SIR Louis admits now that there are two sides to the question of reciprocity. Experience has taught Sir Louis at least one valuable lesson. There was a time, not long gone by, when Sir Louis used to declare that the people had only to turn out the Tories and they would have reciprocity within six months.

"We can't take the States by the throat," said Sir Louis at North River. Well, that is just what Sir John MacGerald used to say. But Sir John used also to say that Canada can live in spite of the hostile tariff of the States,—and experience has proved that he was right also upon that point.

PREMIER FAUCONBERG remarks that he paid six cents for manila in Boston a few years ago, and fourteen cents recently. The reason is that dealers in the States as well as in Canada belong to the ring. If Canada had kept up its duties and protected its own manufactures, there would have been competition in Canada and prices would have been lower.

"We have reduced," said Sir Louis, "the tariff down to the needs of honest government!" With the result that \$11,000,000 additional revenue is obtained by the Government, and that needs of the "honest government" of Mr. Tarte and Sir Wilfrid are \$11,000,000 greater than the needs of the extravagant and corrupt governments led by Sir John Macdonald, Sir John Thompson and others.

"Put us in power," said Sir Louis in 1896, "put us in power and in six months we will have reciprocity with the United States. The Liberal party has always been on friendly terms with the republic to the south. Americans don't want to deal with Tupper, give us the opportunity and we'll show you what the Liberals can do." They have had the opportunity, they have shown us what they can do—nothing!

FARMERS, what have you made out of this New Liberal administration? Apart from cheese and cattle what have you got to sell that you can get a better price for than in 1896? Are oats worth hauling ten miles; and potatoes, where are they? The Tories gave you the cheese industry. The price of cattle and sheep has not changed through Liberal legislation. Potatoes and oats Sir Louis was going to bring back to the prices of 1854 in six months after the Liberals came into power. Has he done so? Sir Louis, having a good time at Washington and London, or speeding over the country in a palace car, has forgotten the "down-trodden New London farmer" of the 1896 times. Has the farmer forgotten Sir Louis?

THE BETTING CHANCES.

MR. EDITOR.—Leaving out of the question one's knowledge of the electorate in the forthcoming election what are the odds against a man who bets that all opposition members will be returned?

IS this reasoning correct. If he bets about one riding, the chances are 1 out of 2 as there are only two possibilities, either the government or the opposition man must be returned. If he bets on two ridings say Kings and East Queen's, the possibilities are double, that is the result may be any of the following:—

- McDonald—Martin.
- McDonald—McKinnon.
- Hughes—Martin.
- Hughes—McKinnon.

If another riding be added the possibilities are again doubled,—so that the chances then that all opposition candidates would be returned would be 1 out of 8, and when the 5 ridings are taken in the same way the chances would be 1 out of 32.

NOW if a man talks about betting \$100 to \$1,000 that all opposition candidates will be returned what are the odds against him? The odds against him in the bet is 1 to 31, the odds in his favor on the money staked is 10 to 1 or the odds, all things considered, is 10 to 31 or a little greater than 1 to 3. So that when a bet is made on the above plan it must be calculated that the chances that the opposition will win are a little better than 3 to 1.
