# U. K. Parties Divided On How To Combat Recession

LONDON (CP)—Britain's Conservative and Labor parties are sharply divided on economic policy to be pursued in the light of the United States recession.

The government's view, as presented in Tuesday's budget address by Deric Heathcoat Amory, the chancellor of the exchequer, is that inflation remains the chief danger, that a similar recession in Britain is unlikely and that present restrictive legislation should be continued in order to consolidate the position of sterling.

Heathcoat Amory and his fellow-Conservatives argue that the fall in commodity prices resulting from the U.S. slump offers an opportunity to halt the rise in Britain's cost of living. They strongly urge that wage increases be tied to increased productivity. OUTDATED POLICIES?

Labor's view is that these policies, inherited by the present chancellor when he took over from Peter Thorneycroft last January, have been outdated by events. Opposition spokesmen point to the rise of unemployment in Britain still insignificant in terms of the entire population but reaching the level of 10 per cent of the working force in Northern Ireland and severely affecting other areas, particularly in Wales, Scotland and Northern England.

In the course of his cautious forecast of Britain's economic future, Heathcoat Amory admitted the unemployment figure is likely to rise but proposed to deal with it piecemeal, earmarking recovery programs for hard-hit sectors. Labor's counter-proposal is a reversal of the government's hold-the-line policy, which has held down the country's productive expansion to a trickle for the last three years.

Called inconsistent Labor spokesmen argue the government is inconsistent in expecting labor to justify its wage demands with corresponding increases in production as long as the government itself stifles production as a matter of policy. The Conservative counter-argument is that such a policy would be suicidal if conditions continued to worsen abroad. Britain would be left as "an island of inflation in a deflationary world."

Former Alberton Man Buried At Summerside  
The funeral of the late George Hugh Montgomery, retired bank manager and a native of Alberton was held yesterday afternoon at Summerside.

Mr. Montgomery, whose home was in Marblehead, Mass., died on April 11th, in Parkwood Hospital, London, Ont., where he had been ill for the past five months. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald H. Montgomery of Alberton. He went to Boston when he was about 18 years of age and after employment with the New Haven Railroad, he joined the Bank of Nova Scotia, and later served as a branch manager in various places including Boston and the West Indies, until his retirement from bank service after 34 years.

During World War II he served with the Department of Munitions and Supply at Ottawa, and made Marblehead, his home following retirement. In addition to his wife, Edythe Pitman Montgomery, in Marblehead, he is survived by two daughters and one son. They are: Jean, (Mrs. Grant Burn), of Marblehead; Marjorie (Mrs. G. W. Shestone), of Toronto, Ontario; and George H. Montgomery, Jr., of Barrington, R. I. Also surviving are five grandchildren.

A funeral service attended by members of the family was held April 13 in London where Mr. Montgomery of one time resided for 17 years. The committal service at the family plot in Peoples Cemetery in Summerside at 2 p.m. was attended by his son, George H. Montgomery, who in 1937, last visited this province with his late father.

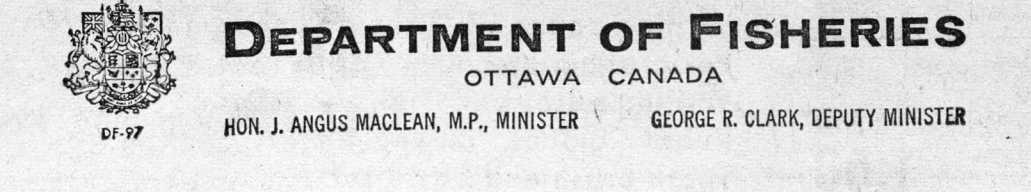
Fair Catches Of Herring Reported
