need to draw out free speech or prevent our organizations from displaying their candidates' posters."

The Premier also praised Souris school principal, Albert Fogarty. "Mr. Fogarty is taking an active part in this campaign, as any citizen of this Island has a right to do. I hear criticism from some Liberal quarters because of the fact that he is a school principal. All the more reason for him to take an interest in public affairs. After all, the candidate who opposed me personally in the election campaign was a school teacher. No Conservative complained about that, nor did the Liberals."

Keith MacKenzie, minister of public works and highways and Mr. MacAulay's running mate in First Kings, emphasized the constructive program of road building carried out by the Shaw Government in First Kings.

"This District used to be neglected and our citizens the forgotten people of the Island," he said. "But from 1959 to 1965, the Shaw Government built 62 miles of new paved roads in First Kings. This represented more new paved highways than any other District in Kings County. And it was not done to favor this District. It was done because the roads in First Kings had been so long neglected by the Liberal Government."

Peter MacAulay commented on the "long-sought, long-promised and long-awaited fishing subsidies from the Liberal Government in Ottawa. Away back in July of 1964 the Federal Liberal Government announced that they would pay a subsidy on boats which met certain specifications, and Liberal politicians travelled the length and breadth of this Province urging our fishermen to construct a new and well-equipped craft, holding before him the promise of a fat subsidy."

"How many Island fishermen benefited from this subsidy since the policy was begun?" Mr. MacAulay asked. "Exactly six fishermen so far have received this subsidy. Where does the Liberal Party of this province stand on this matter?"

Band Members Receive Awards

SUMMERSIDE — A second impressive ceremony held in conjunction with the official opening of the Summerside tourist bureau at the "Red Bridge," Wilnot, last evening.

Prior to the presentations, Mr. Conkey, director of music, explained the significance of the examinations. For many years, Mount Allison Conservatory has conducted local examinations. Formerly the candidates were, for the most part, students of piano, organ or voice.

This is the first time such a large number of wind instrument students undertook the examination. He further stated that Summerside has the largest instrumental music education program in the province embracing a total of 85 students, many of whom, it is hoped, will persevere in their instrument to professional level.

The present group was successful at Grade IV exams. These instrumentalists will attempt the Grade V examinations next spring and one or two have signified their intention to attempt the Grade VI exams.

The mark obtained by a successful candidate may be combined with that received for a theory paper set by the department of education and the aggregate mark is acceptable as a university entrance credit at Academic Grade XII. The Mount Allison instrumental ex-

aminations progress from Grade III through Grade VIII.

Rands of some sort or other have been established in Summerside many times over the years. This is the first time that the subject has been approached from an educational standpoint. When preparations began for the set of examinations many students were curious as to the need for examinations and certificates. It was explained that until fairly recently in Canada, skill in playing a wind instrument went totally unrecognized. Mr. Conkey felt it was most certainly a plaudit for the town of Summerside to be the first Island centre to regard this endeavour as an educational project.

Many accomplished instrumental players, he said, do not possess a certificate of any sort signifying their ability. The successful Summerside students now have proof of their ability issued by a reputable conservatory of music.
